State President Speaks to Local Unit Wednesday

Mrs. Necla Buck, state W.C.T.U. president, was a guest of the local unit at a meeting in the Presbyterian church Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Buck is en route to her home in Portland after attending the world W.C.T.U. convalescence in Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Belle Littrell opened the session with a devotional service. Miss Pauline Vroman was presented in vocal solos, accompanied by Kenneth Raymond.

Excerpts from Mrs. Buck's resume of convalescence sessions follow:

"Of the 53 countries forming the international W.C.T.U., 37 were represented at the convention. Nearly 3000 delegates and visitors from these countries and all states of the union were registered. Sessions were held in Constitution Hall.

"An impressive memorial service was held in Statuary Hall at the statue of Frances E. Willard. Miss Agnes E. Slack of England, a close friend of the late Miss Willard, placed a wreath of evergreens set from 25 different countries at the statue's base.

"President Roosevelt sent a peace message which was read by Hon. Francis B. Sayre, assistant secretary of state."

Mrs. Buck also discussed business of the convalescence sessions on the subject of liquor consumption and temperance education. She reported that the convention banquet lifted three hotels. Bouquets of Portland roses, a myrtlewood gavel and juniper wood articles were among features at the Oregon table, Mrs. Buck related.

The speaker also announced that the Oregon state convention will open October 5 at Newberg.

Mrs. Buck was entertained during her stay in Medford by Mrs. Addie Halley, Reese Creek unit entertained Mrs. Buck Thursday, members gathering at an all-day session at which Mrs. Buck and Mrs. Ellen Thrasher of Grants Pass were guest speakers.

Regular session of the local unit has been postponed until a later date.
