

School Grants Use of Field for Wrestling Starting Monday Night

SOFTBALL TEAMS WILL MAKE WAY FOR MUSCLEMEN

Russell Aheson is Elected Head of Softball Association — Outdoor Wrestling Slated for Ten Weeks

Wrestling gladiators of Promoter Mack Lillard, for the next 10 weeks, starting Monday night, will be under the stars at the lighted high school football stadium. It was announced last night by E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, following a week of negotiations between the two men.

It will mark the first time in Medford's history that regular grappling programs have been staged outdoors, and will darken the Army lights, scene of the matches for the past four years, until early autumn. The announcement was officially made through the medium of typewritten notices, distributed to Commercial and Service league softball team managers meeting in the M. N. Hogan Brokerage company office by Russell Aheson, member of the high school coaching staff and newly elected manager of the Medford Softball association. The notices were signed by E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of city schools.

Work will start immediately on making the necessary changes in lighting and seating arrangements at the stadium. The ring will be brought in from the Army and placed directly in front of the grandstand on Monday. Promoter Lillard will surround the arena with his own 500 reserved seats and platform, and tentative plans call for the entire grandstand being thrown open to general admission.

A powerful floodlight will be dropped over the ring from one of the tall lighting standards now in use on the lighted football field. All matches, during the 10 weeks, will get under way at the same time—8:30, and all shows, as in the past, will be staged on Monday nights.

With the transfer of wrestling to the high school field, all softball on Monday night will be curtailed, with teams originally scheduled for that night doubling up and staging their games Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday evenings.

Acheson Heads League. At the team managers' meeting last night, Russell Aheson was unanimously elected manager of the Medford Softball association to succeed Fred Lennard, who resigned last week. Lennard was given a vote of thanks by the skipper present for his fine work to date.

It was decided that balls used in all Commercial league games must first meet the approval of the umpire-in-chief. It being pointed out that the spheres became dirty or too soft for play after two or three games.

To Pay Umpires. Aheson announced that from now on, \$2 would be available each night for the payment of competent umpires, and a short list of possible officials was suggested. The new association manager will contact the men. Considerable discussion centered on the hiring of arbiters who could keep teams hustling off and on the field, and get games started on time.

Following is the notice handed all team managers last night: "The following changes in schedules for Commercial league teams have been agreed upon by the managers of the teams effected and the

field management of the high school turf field: "Timber Products vs. Piche, scheduled for Monday, July 12, will be played Thursday, July 15. "HUMRS vs. Catholic Men, scheduled for Monday, July 12, will be played Tuesday, July 13. "Timber Products vs. Fluhrer, scheduled for Monday, July 19, will be played Tuesday, July 20. "Fabers vs. Catholic Men, scheduled Monday, July 19, will be played Tuesday, July 20.

"The purpose of the field management in asking to have these two Monday dates vacated is to permit the use of the stadium for wrestling attractions. For the next ten weeks, beginning July 12, the Mack Lillard wrestling program will be held at the turf field each Monday evening. "In constructing the second half of the soft ball schedule the field management respectfully asks that Monday evening be reserved for wrestling.

"The field management desires to thank sincerely the team managers of Piche, Timber Products, HUMRS, Catholic Men, Fluhrer and Fabers for their co-operation in vacating these Monday dates. This accommodation is deeply appreciated by the field management.

THE DALLES, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—Checks, covering four cents per bushel on 553,000 bushels of Waaco county under AAA provisions, which had been lost for several months in a maze of Washington red tape, have been received by County Agent W. Wray Lawrence.

The missing checks were traced by Representative Walter M. Pierce. The error, which will increase local grain farmer benefits by more than \$22,000, was caused by a misplaced decimal point by an accountant.

TOUGH SCHEDULE FOR TIGER SQUAD IN COMING FALL

Hood River, Bend and Eugene Listed Among Foes — Three Games at Home, Four On Other Grids

Three of the toughest high school football teams in the state will face off against Medford high's Black Tornado on the local field this fall. It was revealed today by Coach Bill Bowerman as he released the 1937 schedule. They are Hood River, Bend and Eugene, and each is considered far and away the most powerful aggregation in its respective section of Oregon.

Other teams to tangle with Medford are Grants Pass, Ashland and Klamath Falls. Southern Oregon conference members, and Roseburg. Those games will be played away from home. A tentative battle with Eureka high is also slated for the local stadium, and Coach Bowerman said he was attempting to line up an opener for the last week in September, also to be staged here.

Three Home Games. The way the schedule stands now, Medford will play three games in their own backyard and four away from home, with all three conference encounters being staged in their opponents' lair. If the Eureka affair is billed, there will be four home games, and if an opponent can be found for September 25, fans will see the Tigers in five appearances on the local turf.

The 1937 slate is considered the most killing ever attempted by Medford. Bend, Eugene and Hood River were all champions of their respective district last season, and with each school losing few lettermen, they are again figured the class of their sections.

Commenting on the "killer" schedule, which he negotiated with the idea of giving his team the most representative array of battles ever attempted by, not only Medford, probably, but any team in Oregon, Coach Bowerman stated he could not see one soft spot, with the possible exception of Roseburg.

Hard Tests Listed. He named Eugene high's Axmen, the Klamath Falls Pelicans and Bend's Lava Bears as probably the toughest tests of all, but called the traditional Ashland game, "undoubtedly one of our tallest hurdles." Highlight of the campaign will be the Eugene game here on Thanksgiving day. Coached by Fritz Krisler, the mighty Axmen pounded through an undefeated season last year, and blazed Medford 14-0, for the Tigers' worst defeat in 15 years. Eugene has its entire team back, and is expected to find no opposition in the Willamette valley, nor in the entire state, for that matter.

In alating Hood River for October 2, here, Coach Bowerman picked the outfit that last season played Jefferson high of Portland on Turkey day for the mythical state title. The Applepickers were undefeated until the time. More than one-half the team returns this fall, and Coach Jimmy Carr expects the greatest team in history.

New Bend Coach. Bend high, undefeated last season, although tied by Klamath Falls, will be coached by Johnny Londahl, former teammate of Coach Bowerman at the University of Oregon. The Lava Bears, big and powerful, return almost intact for the 1937 campaign. The game will be here October 20. Londahl succeeds Jerry Lillis this year, the latter accepting a Portland high school post.

With those three teams scheduled, Medford will face the strongest outfit of the Willamette valley, the Columbia river basin, and eastern Oregon. And, that is saying nothing of Klamath Falls, Ashland and Grants Pass, which will all be tremendously stronger than last year.

May Play at Night. Regarding the possibility of playing one or more games under the arc lights, the Medford coach said that the Hood River, Eureka (if definitely slated), and Bend battles might be staged at night, the last named depending somewhat on the weather.

The schedule follows: Sept. 25—Open. Oct. 2—Hood River at Medford. Oct. 8—Medford at Roseburg. Oct. 16—Eureka at Medford (tentative). Oct. 22—Medford at Klamath Falls. Oct. 30—Bend at Medford. Nov. 11—Medford at Ashland. Nov. 19—Medford at Grants Pass. Nov. 25—Eugene at Medford.

Lefty Baker, Roseburg, Cliff McLean, Ashland, and Chuck Ostrom and Melvin McCarthy of Grants Pass finished the first-half with batting marks of 400 or over. McCarthy was the lone league player to connect safely in every game, all others falling at least once.

Boasting a mark of .297, the second-place Grants Pass Merchants finished with the highest team batting average. The Crescent City Chimpooks were a poor second with .259, and Medford's Graters hit only .216 although toiling for third place in the race.

VANDERBILT'S CRAFT TO DEFEND OLD 'MUG' AGAINST ENGLISHMAN

NEWPORT, R. I., July 7.—(AP)—Ranger, Harold S. Vanderbilt's undefeated third defender of the America's cup, today faced two unsuccessful rivals in what cannot be considered other than post-war engagements.

Ranger, after eight straight victories, was named last night to meet T. O. M. Sopwith's second British challenger, Endeavour II, in the international sailing engagement which will open off here July 31.

That meant Vanderbilt had been assigned for the third successive time to thwart John Bull in his 16th attempt to recover the unattractive product of a long-dead silversmith which at the present market value of silver is worth less than \$50.
