"Kid Galahad" Here Thursday
An extra-strong program comes to the New Criterion theater tomorrow for a three-day run. In the feature spot is Francis Wallace's sensational Saturday Evening Post serial, "Kid Galahad," starring Edward G. Robinson and Bette Davis. As a special added attraction on the same program, there will be the official round-by-round motion pictures of the James Braddock-Joe Louis heavyweight championship fight, which ended with Louis as the new champion.
Following closely the story as it appeared in the magazine, "Kid Galahad" deals not only with those elements with which everyone is familiar, but with the behind-scenes maneuvering of the fighters and managers.
Robinson and Humphrey Bogart are rival fight managers. Bette Davis is "Fuzzy" Robinson's young friend. When a hell-hop, played by Wayne Morris, happens to knock out the champ in a hotel room, he is dubbed "Kid Galahad" and taken under Robinson's wing. An 11-round championship fight climaxes the film, replete with excitement throughout.

Divorce Evils Are Subject Rialto Hit
The evils of divorce in its later effects upon the lives of the neglected little ones of an ill-starred marriage are set forth with stark realism in the spectacular drama, "What Becomes of the Children," which plays at the Rialto theater today and tomorrow only with an all-star cast headed by Joan Marsh, Barbara Pepper, Robert Fraser, Natalie Moorhead, Glen Boles and Claudia Dell.
The plot deals with the breaking-up of the Worthington family when the father and mother separate, and their son and daughter, left to their own devices, go astray, and in later years are involved in a murder case, developed through underworld associations. Although innocent, they face the ghastly prospect of death in the electric chair. That the conception of the film plot does not err on the side of exaggeration may be deduced from an event in real life, which in some respects may be said to parallel the picture story.

HOP CROP OF COAST HELPED BY SUNSHINE
SAN FRANCISCO, July 7. (AP) - Field reports indicated today the condition of hope growing along the Pacific coast improved notably during June. Mildew had threatened California and Oregon yields earlier, but warmer weather helped conditions materially.
In Washington there was some mildew and considerable plant lice in the Pugetall valley, though Yakima yards were free of pests.
Relatively small stocks from the light 1936 crop remained along the coast, which produces virtually all of the nation's hops.
