

# HOUR, WAGE BILL GIVEN APPROVAL AFTER CHANGES

## Amendment to Permit Minimum Pay No Higher Than 40 Cents and 40-Hour Maximum Week Favored

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(AP) The senate labor committee approved an amended Black-Connelly wage and hour bill today. The amendments would permit an administrative board to fix minimum wages no higher than 40 cents an hour and a maximum work week of not less than 40 hours.

The committee voted to strike from the original bill a provision permitting a proposed labor standards board to fix "fair" wages and hours above the level at which collective bargaining was deemed inadequate.

Had Opposition It was this provision to which many spokesmen for industry objected most strenuously. John L. Lewis, chairman of the Committee for Industrial Organization, also had opposed it.

The original administration bill would have defined a minimum "non-oppressive" wage and a maximum "non-oppressive" work week but the labor standards board would have been directed to vary these upward or downward to meet special conditions.

Terms of the bill approved by the committee would give the board power to fix the minimum wage and maximum work week for each indus-

try, but the board could not require any industry to pay more than 40 cents an hour or to employ men less than 40 hours a week. No restrictions were placed on how low a wage or long a work week the board might establish. This was omitted, informed sources said, at the request of "organized labor."

None Exempted Also exempted from regulation would be all industries whose collective bargaining had established standards higher than those fixed in the bill.

Chairman Black (D. Ala.) said the bill's requirements on minimum wages would prevent the board from fixing minimums below the prevailing rate in the affected community. No wage and hour standards would be fixed except after a hearing.

Prohibitions against "oppressive" labor practices, such as espionage and strike breaking, were stricken from the bill. Black said the committee felt those subjects could be dealt with through the Wagner act.

### WOMAN LOST \$1300 IN CHINESE GAMBLING DEN

PORTLAND, July 8.—(AP)—The alleged gambling activities of two Chinese establishments gained the attention of the city council today when a woman reported she lost \$1300 in six months. The council ordered an investigation.

The woman's attorney said Portland gambling is more wide open than in the old days at Caliente and that windows at "Chinese joints" have been showing the same "junk merchandise" for six years.

HONOLULU, July 8.—(AP)—The United States Navy launched its mightiest peacetime air search today for Amelia Earhart, missing round-the-world flier, who officials hope is awaiting rescue on a coral reef or sand spit somewhere southeast of lonely Howland Island.

The battleship Colorado, cruising south and east of Howland, catapulted its three fighting planes last night to open the aerial phase of the hunt undertaken by boat when Miss Earhart failed to arrive at Howland last Friday on a 2,570 mile flight from New Guinea.

The Colorado's aircraft, vanguard of a fleet of fighting planes being rushed to the area, returned to the battleship after two hours and 20 minutes, to report no trace had been sighted of the missing plane or of Miss Earhart and her navigator, Fred Noonan.

The planes planned to resume their search today at dawn, (12:30 p. m. eastern standard time), cruising over Winslow reef, 120 miles below the equator and southeast of Howland Island.
