ANTITOXIN USE STOPS TETANUS

On the Fourth of July there are always several accidents due to firecrackers, etc., in every community. Up to a few years ago Fourth of July accidents almost invariably led to tetanus, commonly called lock-jaw. Now, due to the efforts of the medical profession, an antitoxin has been developed that eliminates any chance of infection of this dread disease.

The mortality rate was almost 100 per cent a few years ago, but now so few cases are reported due to the use of the antitoxin. This is just another example of the advances that the medical profession has made during the past few years.

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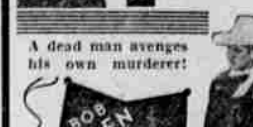

POLICE WIRELESS LOCATES COUPLE IN HOUR'S TIME

They weren't criminals, but two young people yesterday received a taste of the amazingly rapid operation of Oregon's newest weapon in the combat of crime—the state police short-wave radio system.

Frank Floyd and his sister, Hilda, left their home in Holland, near Grants Pass, Sunday, for a two-day automobile trip to the coast. They were expected to return Tuesday morning, but they didn't. Worried parents waited until Wednesday noon and then telephoned the sheriff of Josephine county, who in turn contacted the state police office in Medford, giving a description of the car.

The local state police office then telephoned the broadcasting station at Roseburg at 5:30 p. m. yesterday, and out through the ether traveled the call to arms, none the less efficient because no crime was involved.

The Coquille broadcasting station picked up the broadcast and sent it on, and at 6:30 p. m., just one hour after the local state police had notified Roseburg, the sheriff's office of Josephine county telephoned the branch in Medford that the two "lost" youngsters had talked to their parents over the telephone, and were on their way home. They were "found" by a state police highway patrol car.

Recently put into effect in a modern move to battle crime, the Oregon state police radio system operates 14 broadcasting stations in all parts of the state. Every piece of

state police equipment has a receiving set in it, installed to pick up broadcasting stations.
