

ROAD COMMISSION GIVES CONTRACTS ON FOUR PROJECTS

Bids on Two Jobs Rejected As Too High — Largest Project On Yamhill Sector of West Pacific Highway

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—The state highway commission let contracts of four projects costing more than a quarter of a million dollars and rejected bids on two others as being too high, ending its regular meeting here Thursday.

The largest job, the grading and paving and other construction on 23 miles of the south Yamhill river section of the West Pacific highway in Yamhill county, went to the Mountain States Construction company of Eugene on its bid of \$198,131.

The projects to be advertised are the Lake county line-gap section of the Central Oregon highway in Harney county, and the widening and remodeling of the Union avenue bridge over Sullivan gulch in Portland.

Low bids on the projects were Warren Northwest, Inc., Portland, \$75,795, and Gillpin Construction Co., Portland, \$70,232, respectively.

Tom Waters of Klamath Falls was told that no money is available this year for improvement of the Klamath-Lakeview highway.

CRESCENT GAINS ROSEBURG STARS

The first major player transaction in the Southern Oregon league was revealed yesterday by Roy Deo, manager of the first-half champion Crescent City club, when he announced the acquisition of Lefty Baker and Bert Loeffler, of Roseburg.

Baker, a left-handed hitting outfielder, is clutching at a .433 clip and is second only to Orville Framsted of Crescent City for the league batting lead. Loeffler, a third baseman, had appeared in only one game for Roseburg.

Deo said that the two players were released by Roseburg so that they could procure employment in the coast city. The added batting power Baker will bring to Crescent City is expected to practically insure the second-half championship for the Chitnooks.

MRS. ROOSEVELT USED TAX DODGE CLAIMS REP. FISH

The joint congressional committee on tax evasion read what he said was a photostatic copy of a contract which Mrs. Roosevelt signed in 1935 for radio broadcasts. It stipulated, he said, that after each of ten programs the sponsors (the Shelby Arch Preserver Shoe company) was to pay \$3000 to the American Friends service committee, Philadelphia.

"If she can avail herself of a loophole," Fish said, "then anybody else in America can do the same thing."

Fish said also he believed the committee should call for the income tax returns of James Roosevelt, eldest son of the president; Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Bottiger, the president's daughter; Secretary Morgenthau of the treasury, and his father, Henry Morgenthau, Sr.; Harry L. Hopkins, works progress administrator, and John L. Lewis, chairman of the committee for industrial organization.

"\$1 for Radio Talks."

The contract, as read by Fish, provided that Mrs. Roosevelt was to receive a consideration of \$1 only for talks on "Women Today."

(At a recent press conference, Mrs. Roosevelt denied she had dodged any taxes. "On every penny of income which I received," she said, "I have paid my tax.")

(President Roosevelt, questioned at his press conference today, about Fish's charges, said he did not wish to discuss them at this time.)

But the president, he said, issued a statement to congress in the last month in which he said tax loopholes are of recent date and "then went on to indict all who use loopholes as unethical, immoral and indecent."

The statement, he added, was "practically joined in by the secretary of the treasury."

The New York congressman said he had no intention of making any charges against the president, or of asking for his tax returns.

He planned only, as regarded the president, he said, to file a copy of a statement he claimed the chief executive made in which, Fish contended, Mr. Roosevelt admitted taking advantage of tax law loopholes.
