

# United Spanish War Veterans State Encampment to Open Here Sunday

## MEMORIAL RITES WILL BE FEATURE SUNDAY PROGRAM

Registration Stated at Hotel Medford — Auxiliary and Other Branches Also to Hold Annual Sessions

The 29th annual state encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans will officially open Sunday morning at eight o'clock when registration and housing of delegates and visitors will take place at the Hotel Medford, department headquarters.

More than 500 delegates from all parts of Oregon are expected to attend the four-day encampment, which will end Wednesday, July 14. During that time, the Department of Oregon Auxiliary will be meeting in its 21st annual convention, and the Military Order of the Serpent will stage its 18th annual convocation.

## EIGHT PORTIAS SEEK PRACTICE IN OREGON

SALEM, July 9.—(AP)—Eight modern portias will be among the 100 applicants who will take the annual state bar examinations at the old Salem high school building next Tuesday and Wednesday.

Based on past records, between 25 and 40 per cent of the budding attorneys will fail the examination. To apply for re-examination, they must have permission of the county court of their home county.

To fail three times disqualifies the applicant from ever taking the examination again, thus preventing him from taking up his chosen profession.

## MORE PAY PREMIUMS ON LIFE INSURANCE

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—Oregon insurance companies reported a 2.07 percent premium increase last year over 1935 and a 1.69 per cent boost for the ten year average. Hugh H. Earle, insurance commissioner, said in his annual message to the governor.

Premiums in 1936 rose to \$37,629,693. Beneficiaries received \$19,408,292 in claims. Losses of premiums paid reached 51.5 per cent compared with the ten year average of 53 per cent.

Life insurance topped the list of policies written with 53.4 per cent of the total. The state admitted eight companies last year to make the number in business 519.

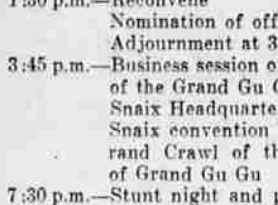

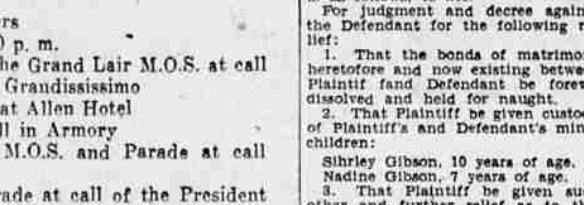

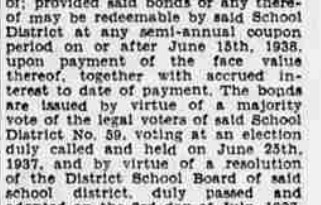

## \$1000 MAXIMUM CREDIT ON BEER

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—Beer and wine wholesalers who give credits of more than \$1,000 to retailers will hereafter be deemed to be rendering financial assistance in violation of the Oregon state law. The liquor commission, at its meeting here, arbitrarily set the \$1,000 credit limit to determine the line between credit and "financial assistance" within the meaning of the law. Under the law forbidding the sale of liquor to persons convicted of drunkenness, the commission announced the purchasing permits of 20 persons, one of the largest revocation lists in the history of the commission.
