

Belcastro and Dragon to Renew Mat Feud in Open-Air Inaugural

CARD IS CHANGED DUE TO INFECTION OF ARABIAN'S EYE

Kohen Wrestles Stojack in Semi-Windup - Clemens Meets Haddock in Opening Match Under Stars

It will be the Black Dragon versus Pete Belcastro tonight under the stars at the high school football stadium in the main event of Promoter Mack Lillard's inaugural grappling program in the open air. Prince Mehalikis, the Arabian, originally billed to tangle with the Dragon, developed a painful and possibly serious eye infection Sunday, and will be unable to see action.

In making the substitution, Lillard stated he believed the Belcastro-Dragon squabble would develop into one of the most sensational ever seen here. It is a rematch of two weeks ago, when Belcastro handed the hated hooded one his first and only defeat in the local arena, forcing the Dragon to unmask and sowing the seeds of a bitter hate.

In preliminaries, Sammy Kohen will meet Frankie Stojack in the middle event and Frank Clemens, the Oklahoma "wonder boy" will face Dale Haddock in the opening match. The main event will be one hour straight wrestling time or the best two out of three falls with the other two affairs being staged under the Australian flag system, six ten-minute rounds or the best two out of three falls.

The program will inaugurate ten straight weeks of grappling under the stars. The promoter today, secured all patrons to procure reserved seats at once. Advance ticket sales he said, pointed to a capacity crowd. Provisions have been made to seat 2000 persons including the 500 reserved seats encircling the ring. The matches will start at the usual time—8:30 p. m.

MEDFORD BLASTS G. PASS HURLERS FOR 19 TO 10 WIN

Smith, Leads Onslaught With 'Royal Flush' - Invaders Boot Ball at Critical Stages of Slugging Match

Led by big Bob Smith, who hammered out four hits, drove in seven runs and scored five times, himself, the Medford Craters opened the Southern Oregon league's second-half pennant race yesterday at the high school field by shelling two Grants Pass pitchers for 16 hits and a 19-10 victory.

Smith, striking his stride for the first time yesterday, drew baseball's "royal flush." He dynamited a single, double, triple and home run in five trips and, in addition, handled 12 fielding chances at first base in perfect style. Duke Hankinson also blasted a home run, and Dick Sakrada and Dick Lewis hit triples to help the Medford cause.

Medford Outfit.

Although outitting Medford, 18-16, the Merchants booted the ball seven times at critical moments, and made poorer use of their base-hits with men on. Pitman and Blacksmith hit homers for Grants Pass and McCarthy doubled.

Larry Pepper, Crater curveballer, worked seven innings on the mound and was not too tough. The Merchants found him for 17 hits and all their runs before Ray Erickson took over with none out in the eighth. Erickson allowed no runs and a lone hit from then on out.

Chuck Ostrom, the former outfielder, tried five innings on the rubber for Grants Pass and that was enough. Medford cracked him for 12 runs and eight hits before Manager Jud Pernoll decided to try Rudy Heyne, property of the St. Louis Browns, and considered quite a hurler. Heyne started the sixth inning and was nicked for basehits by the first six men to face him. Bob Smith's double into right field scoring three mates climaxed the onslaught, during which the Craters tallied six times.

Hankinson slammed his homer in the second frame, a towering drive into left center field with the bases empty. It was Medford's first run of the game. Smith grabbed his roundtripper in the third inning, also with the bases vacant. It was a terrific line drive between right and center field, the hardest hit ball of the day.

Never Headed.

The Craters were never behind, getting five runs in the second, four in the fourth and six in the sixth to sew up the game. Grants Pass scored five times in the sixth for their big inning.

Although making four errors, Medford turned beautiful defensive baseball, playing in three double plays in the clutch to yank Pepper and Erickson out of bad holes. The fielding gem of the day, however, was Arnold Machado's running catch of Pepper's line drive to left center field in the fourth stanza. Smashed on the nose, it appeared well on its way for at least three bases, but Machado streaked far to his right and came up with a sensational diving catch.

Tie for Lead.

The win gave Medford a tie for the league lead, and started off the second-half in merry fashion—for Medford. Winner of the second-half pennant will play Crescent City for the championship, the Chinooks having copped the first-half flag without a defeat. Medford travels to Crescent City next Sunday.

MACK LILLARD WINS GOLF HALL OF FAME WITH DODO ON NO. 4

Widow's Hole - Mack Lillard, soft-spoken promoter of wrestling matches in Medford, proved yesterday that there were other games of which he has more than a fair knowledge.

Always considered a better-than-average golfer, Mack stepped up to the fourth tee of the Rogue Valley Golf club at exactly 12:47 p. m. and whammed one down the alley. Exactly 210 yards away, the little white pellet bounced onto the green, ticked the pin, and settled into the cup. It was goldom's greatest feat—the hole in one, the dodo, and Mack, today, is a hero among his golfing brethren.

Witnesses to the hole-in-one were Stan Sherwood, R. Milstone, E. W. Winkle, and George Coddling, playing in a foursome ahead of Lillard and Jack Berma, George McAllister and W. H. Catey, forming a threesome on the fifth tee.

Mack was playing with his wife at the time. He used a spoon on the 210-yard fourth hole, and he says it felt plenty good as he lashed out that beautiful drive, and even better when the ball dropped into cup. He shot a 41 for the nine holes.

For his feat, the grappling promoter will receive a gold medal from Larry Schade, and his name will be engraved on a plaque at the clubhouse.

Of course, Mack is keeping the golf ball, a Spaulding "Tournament," and the score card, signed by the seven witnesses, will be one of his most treasured possessions in years to come.
