WASHINGTON (UP)—The department of agriculture is inducing thousands of diseased trees to commit suicide, Secretary Henry A. Wallace reports.

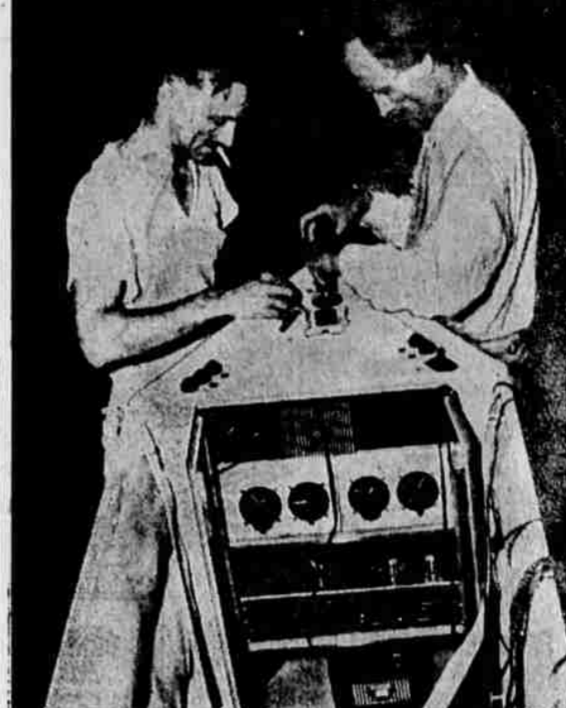
