NEW YORK, July 15.—(AP)—A late rally in U. S. Steel today helped stiffen a shaky stock market.

The list had its troubles from the start with numerous issues, including steel, dipping fractions to a point or more.

Slipping and climbing intervals were frequent and, even in the final period when the major steel stock stepped out in front, many bellwethers failed to get ahead.

Fresh political and foreign problems tended to stem the buying urge. Dealings were comparatively slow throughout, transfers being in the neighborhood of 700,000 shares.
