Visitor From Australia Impressed by American Speed, Strikes, Sunshine

Speed, strikes and sunshine—these are the things that have most impressed Mrs. Nees Lindsey of Melbourne, Australia, on her first visit to the United States. She has been visiting on the Pacific coast since March and is at present a guest at the home of Mrs. Glenn Fabrick here.

The Australian finds speeds at which Americans habitually drive appalling and is continually amazed at our normal rates of travel. She also admitted an inability to become accustomed to the American habit of covering a roadway at 60 miles per hour and then coming to a sudden stop with a terrific wrench of brakes, an occurrence which invariably leaves her breathless.

Although fast drivers are not unknown on the island continent, Mrs. Lindsey pointed out that high speeds are the exception, not the rule. Questions as to the automobile accident rate in her country, she said it was fairly high but attributed the majority of accidents to inadequate and irregular traffic signals and regulations.

Dislike Stop Signals
The variety and number of safety devices on American highways and city streets have greatly impressed the visitor. Melbourne streets, she said, have until recently lacked any sort of stop signal at intersection. During a six-months' trial of such signals, spirited indignation was expressed by citizens of the city, who seemed to consider it an imposition to be required to pause en route to their destinations.

Safety regulations and use of signals is increasing in Australia, Mrs. Lindsey stated.

American cars far outnumber any others in Melbourne. Mrs. Lindsey related, although prices are very much higher there than here.

Labor upsets and strikes which have grown to enormous proportions here in the past several months, are practically unknown in Australia, Mrs. Lindsey related.

Sunshine Amazes
The visitor expressed amazement over the uninterrupted sunshine to be found in parts of the Pacific coast throughout the summer months, in contrast to Australia, where she says, rain may be expected at any time throughout the year, even during summer season.

"We can never plan any sort of outdoor activity or entertainment at any time in the year with any assurance that the whole thing will not be ruined by showers," Mrs. Lindsey said.

Also of much interest to Mrs. Lindsey has been the abundance of flower gardens surrounding even the smallest homes. Such cultivation is seen only in the more exclusive and wealthy sections of Melbourne, she said. The large number of trees on town and residential streets in communities she has seen have also impressed Mrs. Lindsey.

The visitor recalled the suppression of any press reports on the abdication of King Edward VIII until he had publicly made known his intention of marrying the present Duchess of Windsor. Australians, as well as residents of England and other British colonies, were in almost complete ignorance of development until just prior to the formal abdication, she related. Intense excitement prevailed during the crucial December days, Mrs. Lindsey said.

WOULD SELL AUTO TO PAY FINE FOR RECKLESS DRIVING

Lloyd Morrison, 19, of the McAndrew road section, plead guilty to reckless driving yesterday and was fined \$25 and costs by Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman. Morrison was given until 5 o'clock to raise the \$29.50 payment. At the appointed hour he returned and announced he would sell his "pick-up" car for funds to pay the fine. The court then granted the youth further time in which to make a sale.

Morrison was arrested by the state police after a thrilling chase on Barneburg road. A 15-year old boy was driving the auto, with Morrison assisting him when first noticed by a state trooper. As soon as Morrison noticed the trooper had turned around and was following him, he turned off the Pacific highway and sped up the side road.

James Hamilton, a California autoist, stands charged with passing another auto with insufficient clearance, resulting in an auto accident near Gold Hill in which Otto Heckert averts he was forced to take to the ditch to avoid a head-on collision. Heckert's auto knocked down a mail box.

The complaint signed by Heckert alleges Hamilton passed him in the face of oncoming traffic.

Both the Hamilton and Heckert cars were damaged. Both are insured. The case is scheduled to be heard this afternoon.

FAUGHTY FACING DEPORTATION TO NATIVE CANADA

Deportation proceedings will be launched by the bureau of immigration against Harold Faughty, 20, Longview, Wash., sentenced from this county to 20 years in state prison for armed robbery and assault with a dangerous weapon. A similar term was meted to his companion, Buzz Marshall. Jackson county authorities have been advised of the deportation proceedings.

Faughty, a native of Canada, is crippled from a wound sustained last September in an attempted break from the county jail with Marshall. The bullet left Faughty permanently injured with slim chance of ever walking again. He was sentenced to be lay on a cot in circuit court.

Faughty and Marshall attacked then jailer Harry Ingling and a fierce battle ensued. The jailer was aided by a trusty. As the struggle neared the jail office where the keys were kept Ingling fired and Faughty fell wounded. In prison he has been confined in the hospital.

The two youths last August staged a series of night hold-ups at Phoenix, robbing two service stations and beating J. C. Berrang, aged resident. They also stole an auto from the streets of this city which they abandoned after the hold-ups and then stole another auto. The pair boarded a southbound stage at Ashland and were arrested the following morning at Redding, Cal., and returned here.

Faughty, it was brought out at the time of sentencing, had a previous police record as an incorrigible.
