waters surrounding lonely Howland Island, the aviatrix and her navigator disappeared while attempting a 2,570 mile flight to the mile-and-a-half long island from Lac, New Guinea.  
Today's flight orders for 42 planes started them combing 28,600 square miles from a point 220 miles north of the equator and 180 miles west of the international dateline.  
This is the furthest west any United States airplane carrier has ever been.  
More than 200,000 square miles in every direction from Howland, which peaks but two feet above the sea, have been combed by ships and planes.  
Naval authorities here, who previously indicated the hunt would be called off Saturday, said the Lexington probably could not continue in operation much beyond that date because of dwindling fuel supplies.

CCC MEN TO PRESENT  
VARIED TANK PROGRAM  
IN ASHLAND CARNIVAL

The program of events for the CCC water carnival to be staged tomorrow night at the Twin Plunges in Ashland was announced today by Capt. William C. Ryan, district welfare officer.

The water sports will conclude the life-saving and first aid school conducted during the week with 47 members from camps of the Medford district participating.

The water carnival will be a part of the "Greater Ashland" celebration and will be free to the public. The program follows:

Fifty-yard free style swimming race; demonstrations of artificial respiration following rescue, and demonstrations of various rescues; back stroke swimming race; diving competition; fifty-yard side stroke swimming race; underwater swim; fifty-yard breast stroke; free style dash; tumbling exhibition; 100-yard free style race; medley relay; special diving exhibition by Twin Plunges life guards, and matronal race.  
Miss Dawn Owens, daughter of Maj. George E. Owens, district commander, will present the prizes to the winners at the end of the carnival.

CRATER RIM ROAD IS  
NOW OPEN TO TRAVEL

CRATER LAKE (Spl.)—The Crater lake rim road is now open to travel. It had been closed since last autumn by snow drifts.

Six miles of the 35-mile route around the lake from the lodge to the north entrance ranger station is paved. Crushed rock surface covers the 12 1/2 mile section from the ranger station to Cloudcap on the east side, followed by four miles graded surface to Kerr Notch, from which four miles are paved to the Lost Creek ranger station. The remaining eight mile stretch to park headquarters is an old dirt road in good condition. Traffic will not be impeded by construction activities. Two contract now underway are on a new route of the rim road several hundred feet higher than the present road.
