

Hot Battle Is Foreseen On Way to Rate Costs For Bonneville Power

Governor Leads Off In Expected Free-for-All Scrap on Right Method; Martin for Industrial Aid

SALEM, July 16.—(AP)—Although Governor Martin in a statement this week appeared to "throw up the sponge" in his fight to have Bonneville power used for industrial development, capital observers agreed today that the battle has just begun.

The governor's statement that Seattle has "gobbled up" the Bonneville development through the rumored appointment of J. D. Ross, head of Seattle city light, as administrator of the project, was expected to pave the way for a free-for-all fight between those who want a blanket rate over the territory to be served and those who want switchboard rates to aid the development of industry.

Ross answered the governor by saying that any administrator would serve only until the Norris bill, providing for seven great power districts, is passed. One of the districts would include Washington, Oregon, Idaho and western Montana.

To Press Fight

But Governor Martin, who has continually looked horns with Rep. Walter M. Pierce, La Grande, and state Grange leaders over the distribution of the power, may be counted upon to press his fight.

His statement that "Bonneville is through" caused great surprise in the

capital because it was unlike the governor.

He said the state always has been handicapped. Both by the domination of Washington and California representatives in congress and by the failure of Oregonians to agree as to what they want.

Bickering Is Cited

He cited "bickering" over the appointment of a federal judge in Portland as an example of "why old man Oregon doesn't get ahead."

Rumblings of the 1938 political campaign were heard here this week, but it appeared likely that the rumble would be barely audible until after the first of next year.

Governor Martin, reported to be planning to keep his re-election ambitions secret until next year, gave indication of what he thought of the effect of the governor's chair on its occupant when he said:

"Julius Meier lost his health and resources while serving as governor. It killed him."

Health Still Good

But Governor Martin, despite a strict schedule, still is in good health after three years in office. He is 73 years old.

The filings of J. W. Morton, Hood River, for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, and of Nicklas J. Zylstra, Polk county farmer, for the Democratic nomination for representative in congress, are the only ones received by the secretary of state. The primary election is 10 months away.

Tourists from every state, Alaska, Hawaii, Canal Zone, Philippines and the District of Columbia, as well as from several foreign countries, contributed to the wealth of the state during the first six months of this year.

California Leads

There were 53,030 out-of-state cars registered, while that figure will be trebled during the summer months.

California led with 26,068, Washington being second with 9,824 and Idaho next with 1917.

Twenty-two cars were registered from Alaska, and eight each from the Philippines and Mexico.

Of the 237 federally-recognized officers of the Oregon national guard, 144 have been under gunfire.

Spanish War Veteran

Maj.-Gen. George A. White, commanding general, saw service in the Spanish-American war, on the Mexican border, and in the World war.

Brig.-Gen. Thomas A. Rilea, White's executive officer, served on the Mexican border and in the World war.

Col. Alvin I. Baker fought in the Spanish-American and World wars. All 12 of the lieutenant-colonels served in the World war, five of them also fighting on the Mexican border.

Nineteen of the 20 majors and 78 of the 87 captains had war experience.

Since most of the lieutenants are younger men, not so many have had actual battle experience. Twenty-four of the 51 first lieutenants and 12 of the 51 second lieutenants fought in the World war.

ASHLAND IS HOST TONIGHT, SATURDAY FOR CELEBRATION

Banquet Tonight to Be Followed by Grand Opening Lithia Hotel—Heavy Program Provided Saturday

ASHLAND, July 16.—(Spl.)—Many residents from Medford and other southern Oregon cities are planning to attend the Greater Ashland celebration which will start here at a banquet at the Lithia hotel tonight at 6:30 o'clock and continue through Saturday evening.

Elaborate plans have been made by a large group of committees to provide a varied program for the two days, with plenty of free entertainment.

Grand opening of the modernized Lithia hotel will occur at 8 o'clock tonight following the banquet, and all who attend the opening will be given free tickets to a midnight theater party or to a midnight swimming party at the Twin plunges. Free dancing will be provided at the hotel during the evening.

Free Wiener Roast

A free wiener roast will attract a large crowd to lower Lithia park Saturday noon, and the cornerstone laying for the New Lithia theater will bring the visitors back to the business section at 1:30 o'clock.

At 3 o'clock, nearly 100 organizations and business firms, in addition to hundreds of children and scores of horsemen, will stage a gigantic parade through the business district, and \$100 in prizes have been offered to the best entries.

Free dancing will also be available at the hotel Saturday evening, and a colorful fireworks display from the roof of the nine-story structure will flash against the night sky at 9 o'clock. Archie Leggs' 13-piece orchestra from Yreka has been engaged for the Lithians, Ashland booster club, for an open-air dance at the Twin plunges immediately after the fireworks.

To Crown Queen

Miss Gertrude Werner, winner of the Fourth of July bathing beauty contest will be crowned queen of the celebration at the banquet tonight.

Dr. Arthur S. Taylor, professor at Southern Oregon Normal school, will make the dedicatory address at the new theater site tomorrow afternoon as a personal representative of Mayor T. S. Wiley, who was unable to participate. Postmaster John H. Fuller, general chairman of the celebration, and Senator George W. Dunn will also play parts at the cornerstone ceremony.

The city band will be active during the festa, with performances scheduled for Main street at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, at the wiener roast, cornerstone ceremony and parade.

VOTE ON STREAM POLLUTION SOUGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16.—(AP)—An initiative petition to be circulated by the Oregon Stream Purification League will seek prevention and control of water defilement in Oregon, proposing a measure similar to that vetoed by Governor Martin after the last legislative session.

The action was decided upon here Thursday at a meeting of the steering committee of the league.

Petitions will be circulated within the next ten days, Senator Byron G. Carney, chairman of the committee, said.

Carney said the proposal had been approved in general by representative officials of woolen mills, pulp mills, wood working factories, the state planning board, the state Grange and commercial fishing and sportsmen's groups. The outline was drafted by the state board of health and was approved by state fish commission officials.

NEW PINE BUSINESS UNDER FORMER WEEK

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16.—(AP)—Reports from 116 mills showed last week's new business of 60,942,000 board feet of lumber was 17 per cent below the previous week's mark, the Western Pine association said today.

Production totaled 78,950,000 feet, about seven million feet under a week ago, and shipments reached 58,717,000 feet or about thirteen million feet under last week. Orders and production exceeded totals for the corresponding week in 1936 but shipments showed a slight decline.

To date, orders were reported 14 per cent above last year.


STAGE LINE SEEKING REMOVAL OF ICC BAN

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—(AP)—A petition filed in federal court by Howard P. Doyle, operator of the Oregon-California stage line, asked annulment of an interstate commerce commission ruling denying him a certificate of operation.

The petition said Doyle operated a common carrier between Portland and San Francisco prior to July 1, 1935, when the commission's new regulations became effective, and contends he should be granted a prior right.
