Talks to Association About Factors in Irrigation — Old Concepts Disproved by Experiments, He Says

CORVALLIS, July 16.—(AP)—The old conception of relationship of the wilting point of soil moisture to tree growth are not usable as a practical guide to orchard irrigation, Dr. W. W. Aldrich reported to the Northwest Association of Horticulturists, Entomologists and Plant Pathologists here today.

rich declared the relationship of the total foliage to the root area and soil moisture were vital factors in the development of fruit.

In considering dangers of both under and over irrigation of horticultural crops, Dr. A. F. Barse, University of British Columbia, reported the same dangers may harm vegetable crops. His tests showed shallow rooted vegetables do best with moderate irrigation in keeping the plant food near the surface.

C. L. Long, field specialist for cooperative growers, stated alternate bearing in some apple varieties was being eliminated gradually by concentrating on pruning, thinning and fertility practices.
