Autumn Forecast Awaits Decision Paris Designers

NEW YORK (AP)—Hemlines may make headlines when the new fall clothes, now being rushed to completion, make their debut at the end of July.

Most fashion observers think the scene is set for short skirts. This does not mean the knee-length version that bloomed in the "turbulent twenties." Instead, the consensus leans to hemlines from 13 to 15 inches from the ground, though the final decision rests with Paris designers.

The point that has the fashion world thinking is the length of evening skirts. Many style scouts think that the shorter evening skirts Paris launched last season (with uneven hemlines or straight hems varying from ankle length to ten inches from the ground) will be seen in greater number this fall. It is a point to keep in mind.

Waistlines have been a headache up to date. There are strong hints that French and American designers are giving much thought to a lowered line. Already dresses are being seen with molded shirred bodices having seams not far from the hipbones and others with vee seams, one pointing up and the other down, thus giving the effect of a longer waistline without definitely marking it.

However, some Paris designers are flirting with the Directoire mode (which means a high waisted line) and a number of New York frocks appear with normal waists, while the fashion world awaits the decree of its dictators.
