FIX CHAIN STORE TAX VOTE TITLE

SALEM, July 17.—(AP)—The ballot title for the initiative measure to fix chain stores was completed today by Attorney-General I. H. Van Winkle. The tax ranges from \$1 for one store to \$750 for all stores in excess of 50.
The preliminary petition, filed by Harold E. Carlson, representative of the Portland Independent Merchants' association, will go on the ballot at the November, 1938, general election if the required number of signatures are obtained.

FRANC PLUMMETS, FEAR NEW CRISIS

NEW YORK, July 17.—(AP)—A new flight of French "hot money" across the English channel today sent the franc plummeting downward to its lowest level in eleven years and raised fears in Wall Street of a second financial crisis in Paris within the month.
There were few transactions in New York, the rate here being based on the London quotation where excited trading ruled as French funds were poured into the market.
Difficulty of the new Chatoumpa government in financing treasury needs, a heavy prospective deficit and lack of confidence of the people themselves in their currency unit were understood here to have caused the steady capital expropriation.
Wall Street bankers said movement of French funds here was negligible.
