Many at Campgrounds—All Rogue river national forest campgrounds were well utilized over the week-end, a tabulation by district rangers today indicated. Forty cars were registered at McKee bridge in the Applegate, 270 persons used the campgrounds in the Union Creek district and 117 in the Butte Falls area. Largest crowds of the season were reported at Lake of the Woods, Fish Lake and Four-Mile lake. An electric storm occurred in the Lake of the Woods area but no damage was reported. Forest lookouts counted 50 lightning flashes, only one of which struck the earth, none of which struck a tree. An electric storm also occurred in the Butte Falls area but no fires were reported anywhere on the Rogue forest.
