DIAMOND LAKE, Ore., July 20.—(Sp.)—While fishing in Diamond lake is not up to usual standard it has steadily improved during the past three days. Several nice catches were made over the week-end. Stream fishing in Lake creek and the North Umbria remains exceptionally good. Even inexperienced fishermen have little difficulty in bagging the limit in either stream. Boats from Diamond lake to either are in good condition. Most of the lake fishing is trolling with spinner and worms or troutworms while fly fishing is best in the streams.
