**Small Variation Seen in Gate at Baseball Games**

It's a funny thing about baseball and softball crowds here in Medford; the attendance at the four Crater home games hasn't varied by 20 fans and the softball enthusiasts have been turning out nights at about the same rate the past two weeks. Gate receipts for the quartet of Crater encounters on Sunday afternoons has been from \$69 to \$74, and the take for the softball affairs has been running close to \$16 every evening.

Of course, the latter figure doesn't indicate the size of the crowd, as there are close to 500 season tickets out, and no check is made on fans with those duets. A \$16 take at the box office means 160 paid admissions at the softball games, not counting the season passes. **BEAVERS TEED UP FOR COAST TITLE**

Portland's battling Beavers, 1936 Pacific coast league baseball champions and winners in 15 of their last 15 games, are in a better position today to win the title than they were a year ago.

After staggering along most of the season in sixth and seventh place the Beavers suddenly came to life as its pitchers began to win ball games. A year ago they were in fourth place with a percentage of .510. Today they are in fourth place with a percentage of .529.

The Beavers will face a real test this week in a split series with second place Sacramento and fifth place Los Angeles, San Diego, topping the league by half a game, meets a tottering Seattle team and revamped Oakland squad. Third place San Francisco Beals who lost seven out of eight to the Beavers last week, meet Los Angeles and Sacramento.

The Missions play Oakland and Seattle.

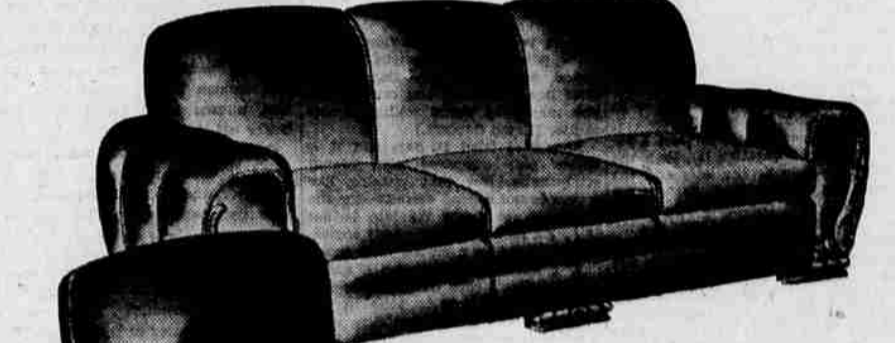
