

### LEGION INSTALLS NEW OFFICERS IN POST CEREMONY

Installation of officers to guide the destinies of Medford's American Legion post for the ensuing year was principle order of business at last night's meeting at the armory. The installation ceremony was ably conducted by Post Commander John E. Enders and the following officers installed: Post commander, C. L. MacDonald; first vice-commander, Geo. Simpson; second vice-commander, Earl York; adjutant, Horace Bromley; Chaplain A. J. Anderson who was re-elected for the 14th consecutive year was unable to be present due to confinement in the Roseburg Veterans hospital but it was announced that he would return to Medford on Friday night's train. Commander Flegel asked that post members be present at the depot to welcome Chaplain Anderson home after his absence of several months.

Following the installation ceremony, Enders presented Commander Flegel with an attractive past commander's emblem as a mark of appreciation from the post for his untiring service during the past year. Brief speeches by Flegel and newly elected commander, MacDonald were heartily applauded.

Frank Hill, Jr. who represented Medford post at the recent "Beaver Boys' State," at Multnomah Falls under sponsorship of the American Legion told of his experiences in this unique camp held for the purpose of teaching Oregon youth the principles of citizenship and self-government. City, county and state governments were set up and the boys elected all their own officials from governor on down.

A senate and house of representatives were formed and bills were presented in regulation manner. Court procedure and legislative matters were studied and a constitution adopted giving the boys much valuable experience in conducting the affairs of government.

Hull was elected a member of the constitutional delegation and was also nominated for governor being defeated by a Portland boy by only a close margin, a showing which was much appreciated by members of Medford post. In closing, Hill thanked the local Legionnaires for giving him the opportunity to attend this exceptional camp which is a part of a nationwide American Legion activity.

Following his talk, it was the consensus that the project should be perpetuated and an effort made next year to enlist aid of local service clubs and other civic organizations in order that several Medford boys may attend.

A plea for assistance to recruit the local national guard company to full strength before the next month's encampment was presented by Cole Holmes who advised that Medford was in danger of losing the present unit unless more members were forthcoming. Commander MacDonald appointed Geo. Coddling and Cole Holmes to draw up a resolution in favor of this worthy activity and to assist in every way possible.

Plans for attendance at the state convention in Albany were discussed and tentative arrangements made to charter a special car for transportation and housing providing a sufficient number of local members sign up. All veterans who plan to go to the convention are urged to phone Lee Garlock at 312 at once.

At the conclusion of the meeting, a Dutch lunch was served by the committee headed by Goodwin Humphry.

The board recommended swimmers seek pools and beaches where there is organized safety. It warned that water unsafe for drinking is unsafe for swimming. Whooping cough far outstripped all other diseases in the report for the week ending July 10. Of the 31 cases reported, 30 were in Harney county.

### COMPROMISE BILL WOULD DEAL ONLY WITH LOW COURTS

submit an alternative for the presidential program.

These foes said, meanwhile, that administration leaders had agreed to lay aside the pending court bill until next week to give them a chance to work out another bill. Later, they said, it would be decided whether to send the administration bill back to the committee or make the substitution on the floor.

Wheeler told reporters flatly there was no doubt his group had enough votes to recommit the present bill. He served notice they would agree to the compromise which would increase the size of the supreme court.

The opposition leader said his group was willing to work out some reform legislation for the lower courts, to speed action, and permit direct appeals to the supreme court in constitutional cases, but was opposed to "roving judges," or the proposed proctor to recommend their assignment.

The Wheeler statement coming just after his conference with Garner lent weight to reports from opponents earlier in the day that the administration was willing to abandon the supreme court part of the disputed court bill.

Spokesmen for the administration were still, however, keeping their lips tightly closed and would not hint at what kind of compromise they were willing to take.

### DRIVERS INVITED TO TEST ABILITY IN MOTOR SCHOOL

The ability to drive a car safely and efficiently will no longer be a matter of conjecture so far as Jackson county motorists are concerned. Tomorrow afternoon and Friday morning the AAA's traveling motor school will be at the courthouse to test drivers scientifically.

The device, brought here through the secretary of state and the Oregon State Motor association, is designed to isolate and indicate corrections for physical and mental handicaps that impair safe driving. The purpose is entirely educational and the public is asked to cooperate in taking the tests.

Tests will cover keenness of vision, glare, distance judgment, field of vision, stereoscopic eye examinations, color blindness, hearing, reaction time, mental alertness, sound driving practices and experience.

One of the most interesting of the tests is provided by a "drivometer" which simulates a number of traffic situations a driver is likely to encounter at any time. Seated behind a regular steering wheel in the laboratory, the person being tested is confronted with emergency situations such as suddenly face him on the highway. All the various control instruments are before him for use as though he were actually operating a car on the highway. He guides a miniature automobile over a road painted on an endless belt. Examiners check the results.

The traveling motor school, housed in a trailer, will be in the courthouse from 1 to 5 tomorrow afternoon and from 9 to noon Friday morning.

### Summer Clearance At Buster Brown

### BEAM FOR LANDING SEEN AS PURPOSE OF STATION SHIFT

When the present bureau of air commerce radio station south of town is moved it will probably be shifted to a knoll east of Medford, Fred W. Scheffel, city superintendent today said he had been informed.

Moving of the station was included in an airways improvement plan announced yesterday in Washington, D. C. Shifting of the Medford radio station indicates that the bureau contemplates installing a landing beam at the municipal airport.

The present station sends out beams by which pilots are enabled to keep on their course. There is now no landing beam which leads pilots directly to the Medford field or permits them to make a so-called "blind" landing, it was explained.

United Air Lines has its own facilities here which correspond to a landing beam.

To be effective the landing beam must intersect the course beams.

Mr. Scheffel said. This cannot be accomplished at present, he indicated, because the radio station is now in line with the airport and thus all the beams would be parallel. An intersecting beam can be achieved by shifting the radio station, he added. No definite date for the new station has been mentioned, he said.

The bureau of air commerce yesterday announced a \$5,000,000 program of airways construction where by additional aids would be provided for safe flying.

Rooms occupied by the Highway pool hall and Sharps cafe, both on North Riverside avenue, will be repaired. Both suffered considerable water damage.
