

Undeclared Softball Teams Tangle Tonight for First-Half Title

SINGLER, SCHEEL WILL BE MATCHED IN HURLING DUEL

Cream of City Talent to Meet When Jennings and Timbermen Take Field at 7:45 Sharp Tonight

Games Tonight. Commercial League: Timber Products vs. Jennings Tire. Piche vs. Faber. Service League (second half): Pastoffice vs. Telephone. Groceries vs. Lions. Softball's battle of the year will take place tonight when Timber Products and Jennings Tire company, each with eight wins and no losses, tangle at the high school stadium for the first-half championship of the Commercial league. The title encounter will start at 7:45 sharp on the north diamond. Boasting the cream of Medford's softball talent, both clubs have belt-

ed their way through a tough eight-game first half slate with apparent ease. Ray Singler, great southpaw hurler, will do the mound work for Jennings Tire and Red Scheel, ace right-hander of the circuit, will wheel them over for the lumbermen.

Piche will meet Faber's in the other Commercial league affair on the south diamond, the game also starting at 7:45. Start Second Half. Tonight will also see the opening of the Service league's second half schedule, with two games slated to get under way immediately following the Commercial league battles.

Timber Products last night capped its eighth straight win to move into the championship game on an even footing with Jennings, by blasting out a 21-5 victory over Piche's before the largest crowd of the year. Three homers, four doubles, and two triples roared from the base-hit mad bats of the lumbermen as they clouted Bill Bowerman and Jean Eberhart, Piche's choppers, for 19 safe blows, while Lindley was giving the losers only four hits.

Bill Bowerman, Piche's manager, became a minor Commercial league hero, however, when he belted a slow ball over the center field fence. It was the first clout over the barrier in a Commercial league game this year. Faber's of Central Point defeated the Catholic Men, 4-3, in the other Commercial league game.

Copco Cops Half Title. Copco last night won the first half championship of the Service league by sking out a 4-3 win over the Postoffice. Both clubs were undefeated until the game. It was a case of brother versus brother, with Ray Singler besting Dick in a neat duel.

INJURIES DARKEN GIANTS' OUTLOOK

NEW YORK, July 21.—(AP)—The New York Giants, one game behind the National League-leading Cubs, today suffered two damaging blows to their hopes of retaining the pennant. An x-ray examination, made only yesterday, revealed that Gus Mancuso, the regular catcher, had broken his right index finger when he stopped a foul tip last Tuesday in Baker bowl, Philadelphia. At first thought no more serious than a bruise, the injury now is likely to keep the valuable backstop inactive for three more weeks.

In addition, Dick Bartell, hurt on Sunday when he made a throw while off balance, will be out of uniform for ten more days. He has a torn tendon in the left groin.

Harry Danning has been filling in behind the plate for Mancuso, with Mickey Haslin taking Bartell's place at shortstop.
