Dr. and Mrs. Grady and son, Roger, of Palo Alto are spending a week with Mrs. Ella Yancey.

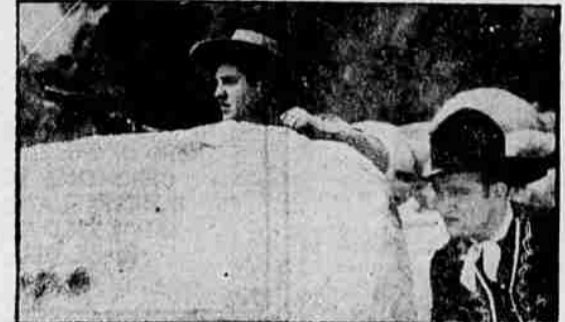
