NOMINATE PEPPER FOR MOUND DUTY AGAINST LOGGERS

Craters to Glendale Sunday for Third Game in Second Half Pennant Chase — Ashland Goes to Roseburg

Games Sunday, Medford at Glendale, Ashland at Roseburg, Grants Pass at Crescent City.

Tied with Ashland's Lithians for the Southern Oregon league lead, Manager Mike Balkovick takes his fighting Medford Craters to Glendale next Sunday for the third game of the second-half schedule. Larry Pepper, right-handed curveballer, will probably start on the Crater mound, with big Larry Nunnenkamp, Willamette university hurler, doing the Loggin' twirling. Ray Erickson and Alvin Merritt may also see action in the box for Medford.

While Medford and Glendale are battling it out in the logging town, Ashland's fast-moving Lithians will face the cellarite Roseburg Pirates in the latter city, and Manager Jud Pernoll will move his Grants Pass Merchants into Crescent City for an encounter with the first-half winners. Southpaw Bob Hardy will oppose George Barr in the Roseburg game, and Rudy Heyne will chuck for Grants Pass against Lefty Mike Koll, Crescent City ace.

At Crucial Stage. The second-half pennant battle has tightened to the point where every game from now on will be classed as extremely crucial. Every club, with the exception of Roseburg, seems to have a great chance at the bunting, with experts figuring Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford the most logical choices for the title, and right to meet Crescent City for the championship.

The Craters will probably open against the strong Loggers with the same lineup that saw action against Crescent City in last Sunday's protracted game. Manager Balkovick will do the catching, Bob Smith will be on first, Rickert on second, Lewis at short, and Hankinson at third. In the outfield, Denny Donovan will be in left, Dick Sakrada in center, and Hooper in right. A change may be made in the catching department, however, because of Manager Balkovick's injured leg. Russ Acheson or John Smith may start in that post. Lyle Russell will be taken as a reserve outfielder.

COOPER IS 6 TO 1 TOURNEY FAVORITE

CHICAGO, July 23.—(AP)—Wiry little Harry Cooper, enjoying one of his greatest seasons along the money trail, was the favorite today as a field of 441 golfers opened play in the \$10,000 Chicago open golf tournament over the Medinah Country club's No. 1 and 3 courses.

Cooper, who has never been defeated in official competition at Medinah, was a 6-to-1 choice to defeat a cosmopolitan array of players which included Mildred (Babe) Dietrickson, a "masked marvel," 11-year-old Donald Dunkelberger of Greensboro, N. C., and most of the country's top-ranking fairway stars.

National Open Champion Ralph Guidahl, Sam Snead and Henry Picard, all members of the Ryder cup squad, were 8 to 1 in the betting, books to take down the \$3000 first prize.

The event, richest medal play tourney of the 1937 American season, drew 204 amateurs, the largest group of Simonsians ever entered in an open tournament.

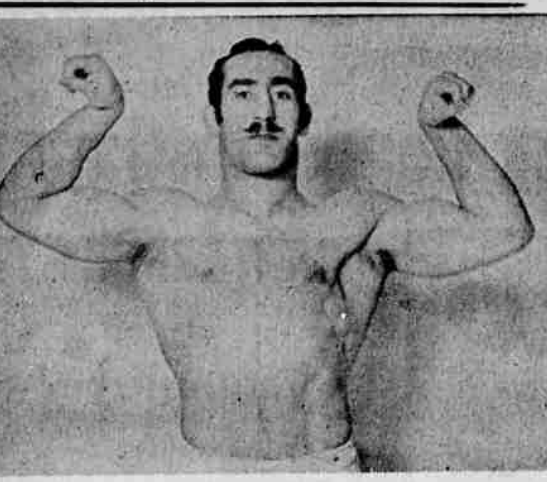
HAMMERSLEY HEADS TILLAMOOK SCHOOLS

Baseball, Golf In Competition Here August 22

Big doings here in Medford next August 22. In fact, that day will just about top any other in the history of local sports.

First, of course, will be the dedication of a memorial to the late Chan Egan, a truly great golfer who made his home in Medford. Taking part in the dedication will be none other than Bobby Jones, considered the peer of them all. Lawson Little, the former Stanford university boy who is rated one of the game's best, Jimmy Johnson and Light Horse Harry Cooper. The top-notchers will stage an exhibition match over the Rogue Valley golf course, and already officials are wondering where they will put all the boys and girls who will fight for a chance to see the world's greatest in action.

Then, there will be that Southern Oregon league baseball game between Medford and Crescent City, first-half champs, which will end the season, except for the playoff. There will be the regularly scheduled battle, and also the replay, from the sixth inning on, of the encounter Medford protested to League President Ed, Lamport, and which he upheld. In other words, it will be almost a double-header, and it may turn out to be just that if the replay goes more than nine innings, which seems likely.

With those two major sporting events slated for the same day, even the same afternoon, Medford will be the golfing center of the world, and the baseball center of southern Oregon. Which is fine and dandy except for one thing. And, that is that if the Medford Craters are wise, they will move heaven and earth to shift their ball game with Crescent City to a different date.

If Medford and Crescent City could get together and postpone their game for one week, say play it on August 29 instead of the 22nd, it would leave a clear slate for both baseball and golf addicts. That wouldn't be a chance.

BITSY BENCHED FOR OPENING SINGLES IN DAVIS CUP TOURNEY

LONDON, July 23.—(AP)—The United States benched Bryan M (Bilay) Grant, of Atlanta today and nominated Frankie Parker of Milwaukee for the opening singles match of the challenge round for the Davis tennis cup.

Parker will play Henry Wilfred (Bunny) Austin at Wimbledon at 2:30 p.m. (6:30 a.m. EST) tomorrow. The second singles match will follow immediately with Don Bugde, of Oakland, Cal., opposed to Charles E. Hare.

For the doubles match to be played at 3 p.m. (9 a.m. EST) Monday, the United States nominated Bugde and Gene Mako of Los Angeles. The British doubles selections were C. R. D. Tuckey and F. H. D. Wilde. Both teams were instructed they could change their doubles selections up until an hour before match time.

The pairings will be reversed for the final singles matches Tuesday. The hope heavily favors the United States to win the cup for the first time since it was lost to France at Germantown, Pa., in 1927.

PORTLAND, July 23.—(AP)—Sixty players will tour the tricky Portland golf club course next Tuesday for an undetermined number of places in the national amateur golf championship to be played at the neighboring Alderwood Country club August 23-29.

Pairings were made today by the United States Golf association and showed most of Oregon's low handicap players out for a crack at the national crown.

Joe Brown, medalist in the recent state amateur championship, is paired with John Bennett, both of Portland. Don Moe, Alderwood, star, who captured the state title, will play with Rudie Wilhelm, former state king. Another stellar match will bring together Vince Dolph and Eddie Hogan, two of the northwest's outstanding amateurs. Dr. O. F. Willing, former Walker cup star, will play James Bushong, Eugene.
