ARKANSAS CHIEF CHOSEN SENATOR

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 24.—(AP)—Governor Carl E. Bailey held the coveted Democratic senatorial nomination today but still was faced with threats of a battle at the polls for the toga of the late Joseph T. Robinson.

The state Democratic committee yesterday ignored agitation for a party primary and accorded to Bailey the nomination that usually is tantamount to election in Arkansas. The general election is tentatively set for Sept. 14.

J. Rosser Venable, Little Rock World war veteran who ran against Robinson in the 1936 primary, said he would run as an independent "if no one else gets in the race by midnight next Tuesday."

An opponent of Bailey in last year's gubernatorial election, Orao Cobb, state Republican leader, urged members of his party to support an independent if one enters.

RESCUE SALESMAN THEN ARREST HIM

PORTLAND, July 24.—(AP)—Firemen and harbor policemen first saved Lloyd P. Kirby, 40, a salesman, from the burning of a boat and then arrested him on charges of drunkenness.

Policeman G. A. Patterson said Kirby was jumped aboard a 41-foot launch after the captain and four passengers had abandoned it when a gasoline explosion set it afire.

From the burning hull, Kirby served notice that he was claiming salvage rights and refused to heed commands of firemen to get off. Finally firemen lassoed him and pulled him off, after which police arrested him.

The launch was destroyed with an estimated loss of \$2,500.

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URGE SPEED FOR HOSPITAL FUNDS

SALEM, July 24.—(AP)—Prompt action by the federal government in approving a grant of \$75,000 for the construction of a new hospital unit and other improvements at the eastern Oregon state tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles, was urged by the state board of control here today.

The cost of the entire project was estimated at \$178,000, of which amount the state will contribute \$100,000.

The application for a grant was filed with C. C. Hookley, state PWA administrator, last April.

MILL PRODUCTION HIGHEST 6 YEARS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—(AP)—Rise of northwest lumber production to the highest level in six years, as reported by Strausburger & Co.'s weighted index, failed to check a decline in the level of Pacific coast business in the week ended July 18.

The Strausburger index slipped 1.2 points for the week to 99.7 per cent of the 1936 average. In the corresponding week of 1936 the index was at 93.3.

Unusual lumber mill activity in Oregon and Washington boosted that industry to a new recovery high of 129.8. Even so, the heavy movements of forest products did not check a 1-point decline in cartloadings for all coast products.

When making canapes, it is advisable to toast the small bits of bread first and then spread with butter to give flavor as well as to prevent the toasting from soaking into the bread.
