HONDURAN VISITOR DESCRIBES REGION AT ROTARY LUNCH

Two entertaining speakers contributed to the program today at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club at the Hotel Medford.

Joseph Walter, commissioner for Honduras and a prominent Rotarian of that country, told of the scope and activities of Rotary International in Central America. Mr. Walter has resided in Honduras for 20 years and is thoroughly conversant with the customs of the people of Central American republics and his description of that section of the western hemisphere was greatly enjoyed by the Rotarians and guests.

Angus Bower, a member of the faculty of the Southern Oregon Normal School entertainingly told the Rotarians of his recent visit to England and the continent, described his thrilling experiences in Rome during a practice aerial raid on that city and pictured the beauties of other cities he visited.

"Fascinating and depressing" was Bower's reaction to Rome.

While in England, Professor Bower studied the Elizabethan stage and amassed information and data which are being used in the Shakespearean productions to be presented at Ashland. Stage settings, without scenery but with effective lighting, drapes and brilliant costumes, will be featured at Ashland in the attempt to faithfully reproduce the plays of the Shakespeare era. CHANCELLOR WILL SEEK SUCCESSOR TO OREGON PREXY

Board of Higher Education Reelects All Officers—Boyer to Carry On Until Successor Is Designated

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Frederick Hunter, chancellor of the Oregon system of higher education, has been authorized to seek a successor for Dr. C. V. Boyer, who has submitted his resignation as president of the University of Oregon. Willard Marks, president of the education board, said today.

The announcement was made at a summer meeting of the board here at which Marks was re-elected president. All other officers also were re-elected with E. C. Pease, The Dalles, continuing as vice-president, and E. C. Sammons, Portland, as third member of the executive committee.

Boyer to Carry On Marks said that Boyer, who started educational circles a few weeks ago with his request that he be permitted to resign, effective September 1, because of the strain on his health, will be expected to carry on for a reasonable time even though a new president has not been chosen or is not immediately able to fill the post on that date.

The process of selection of a successor will be similar to that employed in the choice of C. E. Howard, former superintendent of public instruction, as president of the Eastern Oregon Normal school at La Grande. Dr. Howard was recommended to the board by the chancellor.
