

BANKER GIANNINI IN BITTER FEUD WITH S.F. CHANGE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—(UP)—A personal feud between A. P. Giannini, head of the giant Transamerica corporation, and the management of the San Francisco stock exchange disturbed local financial circles today.

Cause of the dispute was not made known but Giannini allegedly threatened to keep new stock of his company from being listed on the local board until a change of management was effected.

The disagreement between the banker and Frank M. Shaughnessy, president of the exchange, was considered so serious that the governing board of the exchange discussed a special meeting, the purpose of which would be to attempt to patch up the break.

Giannini declined to disclose details of the dispute with Shaughnessy but admitted he applied to New York and Los Angeles exchanges for listing the new stock of his company but made no application here.

The Italian banker was asked to explain his stand in the matter, but answered:

"I'm not talking for publication on this subject."

Shaughnessy confirmed that forms necessary for the listing of the new Transamerica stock were not filed, but said he did not know what Giannini intended to do.

"I am not worrying about it," he said, "I'm tending to my job."

Transamerica, which has Bank of America as a subsidiary, recently distributed one share of Bank America stock for each share of Transamerica and also reclassified Transamerica stock on the basis of five new shares for each 10 old shares.

These new classifications and distributions were effective July 29.

Wall St. Report

NEW YORK, July 30.—(AP) Climbing steel favorites held the spotlight in today's stock market.

While volume was extremely light, gains of fractions to 2 points were well distributed the greater part of the session. There were a few wider swings. Profit selling in the final hour cut extreme advances in many instances and there were a number of losses at the finish.

The steel rally followed Bethlehem's announcement after the close yesterday of the best earnings in seven years and a boosted dividend.

Earnings of other companies, on the whole, were interrupted as constructive, but there were several exceptions among the day's statements.

Trading apathy was attributed by brokers, partly to the wage-hour legislation battle in congress and further doubts of nearby adjournment. It was also thought the Far Eastern disturbance was a factor, if only a minor one.

A handful of utilities, farm implements, oils, coppers and specialties were in fair demand.

Transfers were around 650,000 shares.
