## FEWER ON RELIEF; COSTS ARE HIGHER

PORTLAND, July 31.—(AP)—While relief cases in Oregon decreased 20 percent over a year ago, relief costs have increased about 10 percent because of higher commodity prices, the state relief committee announced today in budgeting August expenditures.

Cost of direct relief for the month, including institutional care, will be about \$215,938. In addition bills now due for July dependent children grants amount to \$14,300.50, blind assistance, \$10,268.85, and old age assistance \$275,467.90.

Multnomah county's presentation that it would be unable to raise its share of relief costs proved in error, Jack Luhn, state relief chairman said. The county commissioners asserted that while the budgeted funds for relief are exhausted, it will be possible to use monies from other sources to meet the need.

## RELIEF PROJECT VASSALS STRIKE

ELKINS, W. Va., July 31.—(AP)—Striking homesteaders protested today to Acting Resettlement Administrator Milo Perkins against his failure to order an official investigation into their charges of inefficiency and mismanagement.

The strike leader telegraphed Perkins after the labor relations division of the resettlement administration had refused to intervene in the four-day-old stalemate at the Tygart homesteads.

Spokesmen for the strikers charged Perkins was ignoring a procedure previously laid down for settling strikes on homesteads.

Although strikers halted work on 24 homes and a limestone plant in the 2500-acre community, they offered today to work without pay on the communal farm to save the crops.
