

William Powell, Luise Rainer Head Cast Of Thrilling Craterian Hit

MYSTERY, INTRIGUE FEATURED IN FILM OPENING RUN TODAY

In a film that affords amazing contrast with their former vehicles, William Powell and Luise Rainer come to the New Craterian theatre today in "The Emperor's Candlesticks." It will play three days.

The star who has become famous as "The Thin Man" now is shown as a dashing secret agent in Europe and Miss Rainer, winner of the Motion Picture Academy Award for her portrayal of Anna Held in "The Great Ziegfeld," is seen as an exotic woman of international intrigue.

The story, from the pen of Baroness Orczy, moves from Vienna to Warsaw, into Russia and back to Paris and London, with suspenseful action at every step. The spies suspect each other and rightfully. Death is close on their heels many times but they outwit it and eventually romance brings them together.

The supporting cast is one that is far above the average. Included is Robert Young as the daring young Grand Duke whose kidnapping starts things rolling. Maureen O'Sullivan, Frank Moran, Henry Stephenson, Bernadene Hayes, Douglas Dumbrille, Frank Reicher, Bert Roach, E. E. Clive and Emma Dunn are others, well known to movie-goers, who are featured.

The title of the picture is derived from the two rare candlesticks, each of which has a secret compartment, that Powell is to deliver to a friend of the Prince in St. Petersburg. Powell hides the Grand Duke's letter in one of the secret compartments and, to make things more interesting, his rival agent, seeking the evidence that will destroy him, hides her evidence in the other secret compartment.

When the candlesticks are stolen, then follows the chase across the countries of Europe, each trying to outwit the other in a mad pursuit of the all-important letters.

Rialto Picture Is Filmed at Astoria; Jack Holt Is Star

Filmed entirely in the great northwest at Astoria, Oregon, "Roaring Timber," comes to the Rialto theatre today for a three day run with Jack Holt in the starring role as a hard-fisted timber boss. Holt has recently appeared as a Roosevelt Rough Rider, an Alaskan poacher, a Foreign Legionnaire and a deep-sea diver, but his role as an Oregon lumberjack is said to be his most interesting characterization to date.

The story of "Roaring Timber" presents Holt as the hard-driving boss of a lumber camp in the bleak north timberlands. He is challenged by one of the greatest jobs of his career when he agrees to cut a record volume of lumber within six months. His herculean task is further complicated by the untimely death of his employer and the consequent assumption of executive supervision by the latter's Park Avenue daughter.

Grace Bradley, a fast rising screen star, appears opposite Holt in the role of the Manhattan debutante who is suddenly and unexpectedly thrust into the rough-and-tumble activities of the Oregon lumber camp. With the machinations of her father's former timber boss and head engineer, a treacherous scheme is plotted to turn the daughter's trust away from Holt, forcing him to quit his post.

A sudden turn of affairs, however, reveals the treacherous and things turn out for the better with a thrilling and surprising climax. "Roaring Timber" also features Ruth Donnelly and Raymond Hatton in comedy parts. J. Farrell MacDonald, Fred Kohler, Jr., and Willard Robertson. Walter Brennan, winner of this year's Academy Award for the finest character portrayal of the year, is starred in Peter B. Kyne's "The Affairs of Cappy Ricks" which plays on the same bill. Mary Brian, Lyle Talbot and Frank Shields play in support of the salty old sea-dog.

STREAK TOO MUCH FOR PRISON CLOWN

DEATH TOLL MOUNTS IN RAILROAD WRECK

VILLENEUVE ST. GEORGES, France, July 31.—(AP)—The number of dead and injured mounted today as rescue workers labored to free passengers from the twisted wreckage of the crack Paris-St. Etienne express

which was derailed only a short distance from this suburban Paris station.

An official announcement placed the known dead at 27 and the injured at 50 while firemen and soldiers reported more bodies were still under the splintered remains of a wooden passenger coach.

After a night-long investigation, officials decided a confusion of railroad orders had caused the derailment.

EUGENE, Ore., July 31.—(UP)—A Wenatchee, Wash., youth, Louis Bradley, 18, confessed to Eugene police today that he robbed sleeping compartments of a Pullman car enroute from Salem to Medford Tuesday.

He also admitted, police said, robbing sleeping cars of a Portland-bound S. P. & S. passenger train Saturday allegedly escaping with \$300 or \$400 in cash, railroad tickets and watches.

Bradley was discovered ransacking a car as a Southern Pacific train moved south through the Willamette valley. He jumped off the train at Divide, 20 miles south of here, but was captured later by a section foreman. He is held in Lane county jail pending arraignment.

EASTERN OREGON EDITOR HAS NEW NOTION ON GOLD

CANYON CITY, July 31.—(AP)—The Blue Mountain Eagle, this town's weekly newspaper of which C. P. Haight is editor, is watching gold dredging operations in the John Day valley with an interested—but not an approving—eye. Its editorial opinion is that the government, if it were smart, would buy gold-bearing lands and just let the gold lie in them. It's just buried again, after refining, anyway.

Extensive dredging operations are underway in the valley, and as dredges go through the area, fertile meadow lands are torn into ugly clasp heaps in the hunt for "pay dirt."

The newspaper approves the idea of Jess Allen, a local citizen: "Instead of dredging up the gold in the John Day valley and then burying it at Fort Knox, and guarding it with soldiers, his notion is for the government to buy the gold in the meadows of the John Day valley, paying the farmers for it, and leaving it where it is. There is no sense in dredging it up just to bury it. That is cockeyed and crazy."

HEDGING CAUSES WHEAT PRICE SAG

CHICAGO, July 31.—(AP)—Depressed by hedging sales in the absence of broad enough speculative buying interest to support the market, wheat prices sagged almost two cents a bushel at times today.

Weakness of the Liverpool and Winnipeg markets, which will be closed Monday, induced some of the selling here. Trade was light, with most dealers confining operations to evening up for the double holiday in the two major foreign markets. Others were included to await private crop reports next week, and the general hesitancy restricted buying.

BEER UNION WAR NEAR STANDSTILL

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—(AP)—A court fight between the teamsters and brewery unions over labelling of beer came to a temporary standstill today with the close of testimony upon a petition of the brewery group for a permanent injunction against an illegal label infringement and interference with deliveries.

Before making a decision, the court will give attorneys for the plaintiffs time to seek an answer in affidavit from Dave Beck, teamster head, on whether he knew that by shutting off outlets he would impose economic pressure on the breweries.
