

Indian and Black Dragon to Renew Bitter Grappling Feud Tonight

PARALYZER ARTIST AND CRAB EXPERT TOP OUTDOOR BILL

Pair Staged Wild Match in Klamath Last Week — Kohen and LaRue in Semi-Windup of Feature Card

Southern Oregon's most bitter, personal wrestling feud will be resumed tonight when Frankie Clemens, Oklahoma's Indian "wonder boy," tangles with the hated Black Dragon in the main event of Promoter Mack Lillard's weekly program under the stars at the high school field. The pro-wrestler had today advanced ticket sales indicated one of the largest crowds to ever witness a match in Medford.

Clemens and the Dragon, meeting in Klamath Falls last Tuesday night, cited a riot among fans that threatened for a time to get out of the hands of police. Lillard said that it was the roughest match he had ever seen. The riot started when the Dragon climbed through the ropes and refused to continue grappling. Storming the ring, hundreds of infuriated fans brandished bottles, chairs and fists in a wild demonstration and one addict, Lillard said, drew a knife and was ready to start carving on the Dragon when police interfered. When order was finally restored the Dragon climbed back into the ring and was promptly sent into Dreamland by Clemens' sensational Indian paralyzer. As a result of that wild exhibition the Dragon has once more become involved in a grudge situation, and local fans expect practically everything to break loose when the two meet tonight.

Meaties to Meet
Two of the local circuit's ace meaties will match eye-gouges and hair-pulls in the middle event when New York Sammy Kohen, the physical culture specimen, faces Jack LaRue, who hails from Kansas City, Kan., and who is a master of the hammerlock. Boasting a win over the Dragon as his most spectacular bid to local fame, the colorful Jewish fellow may be hard put to finish off the lanky LaRue, who knows plenty of answers. Both are good wrestlers when they want to be; however, they usually don't care for some. Each would rather exhibit their roughhouse tactics than keep to the straight and narrow, and one of those things is expected.

One of Medford's most popular favorites returns tonight when Danny Savich, former University of Utah All-American, faces Carlos Rodriguez, the Mexican "hot tamale," in this opening event. Absent for several months, Savich comes back to southern Oregon with a fine record of wins over some great boys in other parts of the country.

Cleanies to Open
Both Savich and Rodriguez are grapplers of the cleanest type. Savich has built his reputation as a pikin' star, possesses probably the most effective sonnenberg and drop-kick ever unleashed in a local arena. The "hot tamale," Old Mexico's contribution to the ranks of clean grapplers, relies mainly on the hammerlock, which no applier with must finesse. The squabble should be clean and scientific.

First two bouts will be staged under the Australian system consisting of six 10-minute rounds or the best two out of three falls. Main event will be a one hour time limit affair.

SAM SNEAD COPS IN ST. PAUL OPEN

HARDY'S SLANTS BRING LITHIANS 7 TO 3 VICTORY

Big Crowd Sees Ashland Add to Winning String On Medford Diamond — Pepper, Hughes Local Hurlers

Behind the stellar pitching of Southpaw Bob Hardy, Ashland's Lithians defeated the Medford Craters yesterday at the high school field, 7-3, to give the undisputed Southern Oregon league lead. It was Ashland's fourth straight second-half victory and no defeat, and Hardy's sixth win of the year.

The lanky portlander, displaying a razor-edged curve and sizzling fast ball, fanned six Medford batters and allowed only five hits. While he was keeping the Craters almost completely handcuffed, the Lithians were taking advantage of four Medford errors and six base hits off Larry Pepper and Jack Hughes to win easily. In fact, Medford was at no time in the ball game.

Huge Crowd Present
The largest crowd to witness a ball game in Medford in several years turned out to see a resumption of the Pepper-Hardy hurling feud, and for five innings it was not disappointed. However, Manager Balkovick of the Craters letted Pepper in the sixth frame with none away after a walk and a base hit, and Jack Hughes finished. In Pepper's five plus innings of toil, he gave up only two hits. Hughes, hurling the remainder of the game, was touched for four blows and five runs. Two errors each by Dick Lewis and Bob Smith, usually reliable, were factors that accounted for Medford's first defeat in the second-half race.

Rigid Regulation Again Prescribed for Duck Hunting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Duck hunters will have a 90-day season this fall, with the same rigid regulations of the last two years.

The daily bag and possession limit on geese and brant was raised from four to five in rules announced yesterday, but that on ducks was kept at 10.

Baiting of waterfowl and doves and the use of live decoys are prohibited and the three-shell limit on repeating shotguns was retained.

The northern zone season on ducks, geese, Wilson's snipe and coot opens October 9 and closes November 7. In the intermediate zone the season is November 1 to November 30, and in the southern zone November 27 to December 26.
