repair and reconstruction of paved streets, it was said.

The streets and roads committee will immediately determine what streets are to be repaired and reconstructed first so that bids for the construction job may be called for without delay, it was brought out.

The bid submitted by Camp & Co. was looked upon as reflecting the excellent credit of the city and its present sound financial condition.

Congratulations City. A. L. Hawn, vice president of E. M. Adams & Co., who represented his firm at the meeting, congratulated the city. He said the successful bid was excellent from the city's point of view and declared the council was wise in fixing a short-term maturity for the issue. Under the procedure adopted by the council, the bidders were required to stipulate the coupon rate. The interest rate fixed by Camp & company, is lower than that on any city bonds now outstanding.

The council adopted a resolution designed to bring conduct of city business more closely to the business management type of administration and to secure co-ordination of department activities and a more efficient management of business of the city.

Under the resolution the office of city superintendent is created. This title has been in use for some time but the office heretofore had never been legally created. The city superintendent will also be street commissioner. The resolution provided the building inspector, under the re-arranged set-up, will be assistant superintendent and will assume any duties, in addition to those he has now, that may be delegated to him by the superintendent.

Special Committee. The resolution also provided for the creation of a special committee of three councilmen to be known as the "business management committee" whose duties will be to advise and assist the city superintendent and the various departments for the purpose of establishing an efficient and economical administration of the city's business affairs and to co-ordinate the work of the various departments.

While the change involves no radical departure from present methods, it does centralize more responsibility

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Romeo and Juliet SECOND OFFERING ASHLAND FESTIVAL

"Romeo and Juliet," Shakespeare's immortal tragedy which has been presented on more stages and in more forms than any other popular play in history, was presented in Ashland's outdoor theatre last night just as Shakespeare wrote it and in the manner which he understood.

The play was the second in the series of three which make up this year's Oregon Shakespeare Festival. "Twelfth Night," a gay comedy, will be presented tonight and will offer a striking contrast to last night's heavier drama.

Angus L. Bowmer, director of the festival productions, will appear tonight in a role to his liking. He is cast in "Twelfth Night" as Sir Toby Belch, a roistering character much given to the cup.

T. Arnold Baughn, Cornish player, will be seen as Orsino, Duke of Illyria. Jim Parsons will play Sebastian, brother to Viola. Morgan Cook will be Antonio, sea captain friend of Sebastian. Harold Reedy will play Valentine. Norman Hamilton will be Curio and George F. Smith will appear as Malvolio.

William Cottrell, Bowmer's assistant director, will play Fabian, servant to Olivia, and Bob Stedman will play Feste, a clown. Dorothy Pruitt will be seen as Olivia, a rich countess, and Doreen Leverette as Viola. Kitty Ingle will play Maria, Olivia's waiting woman. Lyle Heltz will be the Priest, with Arden Hall and Officer, Frank Smith and Ruth Aston as attendants, and Audrey Lofland and Kathleen Nourse as curtain boys.

Attendance last night continued to bear out the prediction that this year's festival will break all records. The evening was perfect for an outdoor show and the crowd was enthusiastic over the work of the performers.

Kitty Ingle, of Ashland, was a lovely Juliet, and with T. Arnold Baughn as Romeo, the team left little to be desired. Angus L. Bowmer played Escalus, Prince of Verona, and John Ralsacher was Paris, kinsman to the prince.

Leroy Lindner played Montague and Robert Stedman was Capulet. Arden Hall appeared as the old man of the Capulet family; and William Cottrell played Benvollio, friend to Romeo. Morgan Cook appeared as Tybald with George F. Smith as Friar Laurence and Lyle Heltz as Friar John.

Rodney Rogers played Balthazar, servant to Romeo and John Barker was Gregory, servant to Capulet.

Jim Baughman again appeared as Peter, servant to Juliet's nurse, and Lyle Heltz was Abram, servant to Montague. William Cottrell play an Apothecary and Arden Hall, Lyle Heltz and James Parsons were the Three Musicians.

Norman Hamilton appeared as Page to Paris, Pat Carlson as Lady Montague and Frances E. Hardy as Lady Capulet. Ruth Aston appeared as the nurse to Juliet. Margaret Knox will play this role in the Thursday production of the play.

In the cast as Citizens of Verona were Doreen Leverette, Maxine Gearhart, Esther Carter, Roxanne Nourse, Wanda Minter, Annabel Heath, Harold Reedy, Frank Smith and Norman Hamilton. Audrey Lofland and Kathleen Nourse were curtain boys.

BANWELL ADDRESSES 20-30 CLUBBERS ON AIR TRANSPORTATION

Continued and increased interest in aerial transportation was urged by A. H. Banwell, secretary of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, in an interesting talk given last night at the regular meeting of the Medford 20-30 club at the Jackson Hotel.

Banwell recounted highlights of the recent northwest aviation planning conference held in Boise, Idaho, at which he presided.

The Pacific northwest is rapidly becoming the hub of air commerce, Banwell stated, pointing out that in the near future when air commerce with Asia becomes a reality, this section of the country should be prepared to assume its proper place in the picture. The conference, he said, is the only one in the United States and includes five states in the Pacific northwest and two provinces of Canada. So important is the conference, he pointed out, that it was attended by General Weesover, chief of the United States army air corps, Commander Rosendahl of the United States navy, and the most prominent of airplane builders and designers.

A regular business meeting of the club was held following Banwell's talk.
