## GOLFERS DIVIDED INTO EIGHT TEAMS FOR TOURNAMENT

Each Team to Play One Match Per Week — Winning Outfit to Be Feted at End of Play, Sept. 17

Thirty-two golfers of the Bogus Valley Golf club, divided into eight four-man teams, will this week start firing in a team tournament that will end September 17. Each four-man team will play one match a week, with action taking place on any day except Saturday and Sunday. Matches will be played on a medal basis over nine holes, with full handicaps allowed.

At the conclusion of the tourney, the winning team will be feted. One point will be given for each victory, the team collecting the greatest number of points being declared the champion. Each of the eight teams will play the other once.

Substitutes Allowed. Tony Roberts, club pro, announced that in case a team was short one player, it could substitute another player whose handicap did not exceed five more or five less than the missing player's handicap. Two players missing from a team would constitute a forfeiture, Roberts said.

Gehrig Faux Pas Makes Him Chief of Left Handers

Until last Friday evening, the New York Yankee's Mr. Lou Gehrig was regarded with pardonable suspicion by his many brethren of that peculiar race of citizens who go through life doing things all backwards. Although physically a southpaw, Mr. Gehrig had previously conducted himself in a manner entirely unbecoming a member of the strange clan.

Noted throughout history for their queerness, thousands of left-handers could not believe that the mighty Iron Man of baseball was one of them. He must be just a right-hander, they thought. Just an ordinary, legitimate right-hander. They couldn't be blamed, either, because about the only eccentricity displayed by Mr. Gehrig until the said Friday was the uncanny ability of being able to belt homers into the right field stands off right or left-handed pitchers with equal facility, considered a praiseworthy trait.

There is no doubt now, however, in the hearts and minds of thousands of southpaws as to Mr. Gehrig's right to be called a true left-hander. Moreover, he will undoubtedly go down in the book as the greatest left-hander, mentally and physically, that ever lived. The legendary feats of Babe Waddell, a southpaw pitcher who he wasn't a fireman, will seem mild in comparison. The antics of Babe Ruth when at the height of his glory as a playboy, free-wheeling ball player, will be viewed with a bored glance when lined up against Gehrig's faux pas. And Dizzy Dean, a mental southpaw, will appear as nothing more than a steady, hard-working ball player when compared to Mr. Gehrig. Even Roy Riegels, who ran the wrong way in a football game, will be dwarfed by the mental blunder committed by the Iron Man.

Gehrig's failure to handle that easy chance may result in dire consequences. When the famous Gehrig booted one by telling his radio audience, while broadcasting on the Huskies program, that he ate Wheaties for breakfast to make him an iron man, the stars was set for a unanimous curtilment by manufacturers of all southpaws, and we could blame them. After that or in the clutch, it seems that anyone who would sign up a portlander of any description for an air appearance would be literally taking bankruptcy or worse in his own hands.

For instance, who could trust a southpaw to describe the amazing comfort, the remarkable performance, the tremendous power of, say, one of Walter P. Chrysler's finest vehicles. Why, young Mr. Southpaw might get up there before the mike and tell ten million listeners to "Ask the man who owns one." Or, stammering something about "Body like a fisher." In fact, anything could happen. That was definitely proved by Mr. Lou Gehrig.

## YANKS ARE THERE WITH HOME RUNS DURING CLUTCHES

Circuit Clouts Give Ruppert's Boys Both Ends of Double Bill With White Sox—Gehrig Is Honored

A series for the league lead, an all-star game, or a world series gives many a team the blind staggers. But not Colonel Ruppert's boys in white. The Yanks just swing their bludgeons and bring home the bacon.

They reserve their most momentous feats for days when the competition is tight and the stands are full. Employing their time-honored home run technique—"hit 'em where they can't possibly be"—the Yanks blew down the Chicago White Sox in both games of a doubleheader yesterday, 7 to 2 and 5 to 3, and pushed their league lead to seven games.

The season's largest week-day crowd, 66,767 fans, was on hand. Home runs, trade mark of the Yankees since 1921, won both games. Bill Dickey hit his 19th with three on in the eighth inning of the second game to clinch a bombardment that had begun when Lou Gehrig, starting his 1900th consecutive game, had shot his No. 22 into the stands with two mates aboard in the fifth inning of the opener. In between these two wallops the Yanks batting handiit, Joe DiMaggio and Tony Lazzari, took care of the scoring. Joe hit No. 32 with two mates aboard in the seventh inning of the first contest and Tony got one in each game.

Ruffing Holds Sox. Red Ruffing muffed the Sox in the opener for his 14th victory, and Vernon Gomez seemed headed the same way in the second game when the south side's heroes ganged him for three runs in the seventh and eighth. But when the Yanks came up in the latter inning, Ruffie slugged, DiMaggio doubled, Gehrig walked and Dickey lined one into the stands.

The Sox, who came to New York with gaudy dreams of a four-game sweep, are burdened with a two-game deficit and the series is half over. For the moment, their pennant ambitions are squelched.

Gehrig, as chipper as a rookie in the field and at bat, was presented a watch between games for being the league's most valuable player in 1936.

## "OLD PETE" FEARS BONUS YOUNGSTERS MAJOR GOAL

"I'm afraid a lot of these kids think more about what salary they can collect than about playing ball," he opined from his corner on a dugout bench.

"They ought to think first about bearing down in there and playing baseball. I thought the man was crazy when he offered me money to pitch for Galesburg, Ill., back in 1908. Why, I got \$250 a month the first year I was in the big leagues and though I was getting rich."

"Old Pete" is ruddy of complexion and his blue eyes are clear, but his uniform belt encircles a paunch and he hasn't pitched since early spring. "The old souper's just plain worn out, I guess," he said.

He brought a Springfield, Ill., semi-pro team here for the Denver Post tournament and yesterday watched out 22 batters in scoring Springfield's second victory.

Are the major leagues in any danger "going sissy" in comparison with the roistering days when Alexander broke in? He says not.

"The big show has more high school and college graduates than in my day," he said, "but that doesn't keep a real ball player from knocking the baseman head over heels to get to that bag."
