Judge Day Extends Welcome in Starting Conclave - Afternoon is Devoted to Golfing, Fishing, Touring

Annual convention of the Oregon State Insurance Agents' association opened here this morning.

At the morning session held in the county courthouse auditorium, an address of welcome was delivered by County Judge Earl B. Day.

Claude Naeberg of Marshfield, president of the association, gave his annual address. A message was read from State Insurance Commissioner Hugh H. Earle of Salem.

Brief addresses were given by Stanley Stillman, Hugh Lacey and R. M. Alton, all of Portland.

No business sessions were scheduled for this afternoon, the visiting delegates going to the Rogue River Golf club for the annual tournament.

Non-golf playing delegates journeyed to Crater lake national park. Some went fishing in Rogue river and other nearby streams.

George W. Hearle of Portland, chairman of the executive committee, will preside at the Friday morning session, at which important talks will be made by William H. Menn of Los Angeles, western state executive committee of the National Insurance Agents' association.

BEAR ATTEMPTS KIDNAP OF SLEEPING CHILDREN

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Two salt Lake City children scooped today at the supposed docility of bears roaming Yellowstone national park.

The children—Curtis J. Butts, Jr., 14, and his five-year-old sister, Tessie—were on the first time an experience with a bruin who tried to kidnap them while they were vacationing in the park, July 19.

The Butts family was camped at West Thumb. The children were in a sleeping bag lying near the tent's entrance. Father Butts was awakened by his son's screams as the bear snatched its fangs into the sleeping bag.

"Father—chased the bear and as it dragged the bag, I scrambled out," Curtis said. "Father through the camp the bear dropped the bag and stood guard near it. Tessie was still inside.

"Father slipped his hand inside the bag and grabbed Tessie by the hair. When the bear seized the bag and started to run again, father hung onto Tessie and dragged her out."

"Curtis was hit on the right hand and hip by the bear. Neither child was seriously injured. "Tessie explained why she snuggled so deeply into the bag. "I wanted to hide so the bear couldn't bite me," she said.

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HOLDING COMPANY TAX BOOST URGED TO STOP DODGING

Joint Congress Committee Proposes Eight-Point Program in Legislation to Plug Income Tax Leaks

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—A senate-house tax committee recommended today drastic increases in domestic personal holding company taxes as one means of preventing tax avoidance.

The committee, proposing for enactment at this session a \$100,000,000 eight-point program of legislation to plug income tax leaks, also recommended an innovation in the taxation of foreign personal holding companies.

It suggested that undistributed net income of such companies should be figured in the gross income of the American owners of the companies just as if it actually had been distributed to them.

Means Big Increase Treasury officials, who cooperated with the joint committee in making an investigation which brought in the names of many prominent citizens, estimated roughly that enactment of the committee's recommendations would mean an increase of \$100,000,000 in federal revenue.

The committee did its work under the chairmanship of Representative Donahoe (D-N. C.), who also is chairman of the house ways and means committee. A member of the joint group was Senator Harrison (D-Miss.), chairman of the senate finance committee.

In addition to the domestic and foreign personal holding company proposals the committee recommended stiffer tax treatment for the following methods used by wealthy persons to reduce their taxes: Incorporation of personal talents (such as acting), artificial deductions for interest and business expense, multi-trusts, non-resident aliens, and artificial deductions for losses from sales of exchanges of property.

Followed Investigation The committee report to the house and senate followed an investigation extending over several weeks and undertaken at the request of President Roosevelt. The president said in a message to congress that a comparatively small number of wealthy persons was reducing tax payments by

methods which he considered should be checked by legislation. The committee proposed to lift the surtax on domestic personal holding corporations to 65 per cent on the undistributed net income not in excess of \$20,000 and 75 per cent on that amount above \$20,000.

The present rates are 8 to 48 per cent. "No low minimum rate cap be provided," the report said, "without enabling wealthy individuals to escape substantial taxes through the formation of multiple personal holding companies."

In addition, the committee suggested that deductions allowed such companies be altered broadly, and some revoked entirely. With regard to taxing undistributed net income of foreign personal holding companies as though already distributed to American owners, the committee said it was recommending "a method of taxation which is a departure from any previously used with respect to corporate income."

"The committee feels, however," the report added, "that his innovation is necessary to protect the revenue and prevent further use of one of the most glaring loopholes now existing." Thereupon the committee proposed that tax laws should be revised to encourage dissolution of foreign personal holding firms "as promptly as possible."
