

NATIONAL SURVEY OF PLAY CENTERS BEGUN IN OREGON

Park Service Sets Up Organization To Study Recreational Needs, Facilities—Plan Has Four Phases.

PORTLAND (SpI)—The national recreational study announced recently by the secretary of the interior, Harold L. Ickes, is underway for Oregon. The national park service with offices here is directing the work.

An act of the 75th congress authorizing a recreational study on a national scale is permanent legislation and its results will likewise be permanent in effect. The study Ickes said, is the most far-reaching of its kind ever attempted in the United States.

Gov. Charles H. Martin accepted Secretary Ickes' offer to cooperate in this undertaking and called attention to a long-time program of state recreational development formulated by the Oregon state parks commission.

Work Organized This undertaking is an outgrowth of emergency conservation work cooperation between the federal government and the states through which hundreds of state park and recreation areas have been extended and developed by the civilian conservation corps since 1933.

Using emergency funds, the national park service has set up under its branch of recreational planning and state cooperation a basic organization for initiating the study.

It is the hope of the national park service to enlist the assistance of the Oregon state planning board and other state, private and federal agencies concerned with planning for present and future recreational development.

Four-Fold Study In Oregon the study will include (1) the gathering of data relating to existing parks and facilities; (2) a study of social, industrial and population trends; (3) an inventory of potential park, parkway and recreational areas; and (4) a formulation of definite plans and recommendations for meeting the present and future recreational needs of the people, covering further development of existing areas, legislation, finance, administration and maintenance.

The study, it was emphasized, will have immense value in connection with emergency conservation work activities in that it provides for planning to produce master development programs for 20 to 30 years in the various states. This procedure, it was pointed out, is in line with President Roosevelt's plan for a national program for recreation.

It was further emphasized, now that there is a definite authority for a closer cooperation between the federal government and the states, that it is expected state and local park, parkway and recreational-area planning will receive greater consideration and that the work will be systematized and correlated on a state, regional and nation-wide basis.

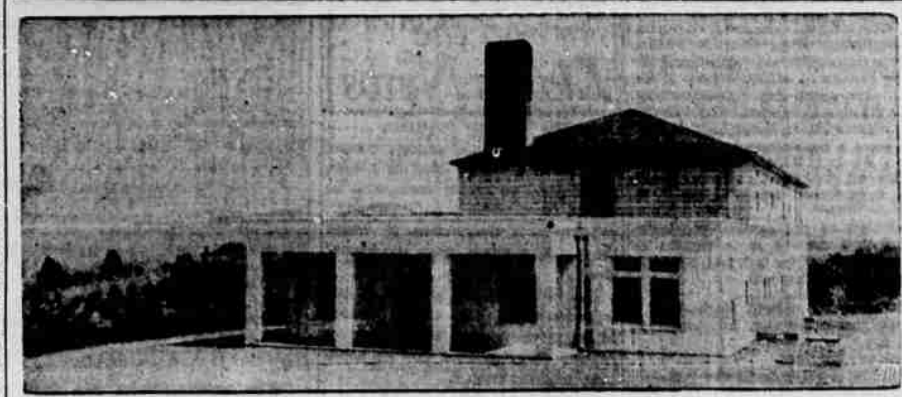

NAVY EXTENDING AERIAL DEFENSE IN PACIFIC AREA

Fleet of Giant Bombers Is Planned for North, East and South Outposts As Operation Scope Widens

SAN DIEGO, Cal.—(UP)—The navy is lengthening and strengthening its "first line of defense" in the Pacific. Before the end of 1938 huge patrol bombing planes, most powerful air fighters of their type in the world, will be dropping along almost daily over some part of an area embracing some 8,000,000 square miles. The planes will be stationed so as to be instantly available should trouble rise in the Pacific.

It is the plan of the navy to have 140 of these most modern fighting craft on duty in the great semi-circle extending from the Aleutian Islands, through Guam, Wake and Midway to the Hawaiian group and then bending eastward to Panama before another 12 months pass.

Planes designated for this duty are the PBV-2's, with a cruising range of nearly 4000 miles, a top speed of 150 miles an hour, with a full load. The full load consists of at least 10,000 pounds of gasoline, a crew of six or seven men, machine guns, munitions, and more than a ton of bombs.

Massed Flights Planned. In order to have these fighters at strategic points, the navy, during the next few months, will sponsor at least nine long distance, mass flights, similar to the three carried out already this year as "routine transfers."

Hardly had the planes of the VP-3-F squadron landed at Coco Solo, C. Z., after a 3065-nautical-mile flight from San Diego than it became known at least two more Panamas flights are to be undertaken in the near future, with the crews already ready here for intensive training.
