

### NEW FARM GROUP BEGINS CAMPAIGN FOR MEMBERSHIPS

We will definitely oppose radical agitators seeking to exploit the cause of labor," the statement declared. "We approve the principle of collective bargaining. We believe that employers should at all times be willing to meet with representative groups of employees, whether organized or not organized. We favor paying the highest wages consistent with sound business operation.

"Associated Farmers is sincerely interested in the preservation of law and order, especially as that law and order relate to the harvesting, processing and movement of crops along the highways of this county. This orderly handling and movement of crops affects the happiness and prosperity of every citizen of Jackson county.

"Associated Farmers opposes the violation of law by any group, either vigilante or radical. We favor the protection of all interests by legal means."

The need of such an organization as Associated Farmers was created by repeated riotous disturbances in various agricultural districts of California, the statement said.

"During the past four years, 37 labor disturbances have been deliberately caused in California by radical agitators who are not workers and who have less interest in the welfare of workers than they have in the overthrow of established government," the statement averred.

"It is significant that these so-called labor agitators are concentrated in districts paying the highest agricultural wages in the world—the Pacific coast states."

The menace of radical agitation in Oregon is imminent, the statement indicated, saying that "the entire state is facing radical activities intended to obstruct normal harvesting, processing and transportation of crops and to create losses for all concerned."

The statement concluded with an invitation to all persons engaged in farming to join the association.

### NORGE MARATHON UNIT IS RETIRED

### Bee Keepers Get Marketing Help

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed today a bill authorizing the secretary of agriculture to enter into marketing agreements with bee keepers. Congress earlier had renewed agricultural adjustment act marketing provisions applicable to milk and other farm commodities, but honey was not included in the first authorization.

### Mott To Support Hatcheries Bill

ASTORIA, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Representative James W. Mott advised City Attorney James L. Hope he would support before the house commerce committee and on the floor the bill authorizing expenditure of \$500,000 for construction of federal fish hatcheries on the Columbia river and its tributaries. The measure was approved by the senate commerce committee as amended by Senator Steiwer. Fisheries Commissioner Frank Bell had testified unfavorably on the ground the measure conflicted with the president's fiscal policies.

### Hood River Fruit Scale Deadlocked

HOOD RIVER, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Week-long negotiations failed to bring an agreement between the Apple Growers' association and the Fruit, Cannery and Agricultural Workers' union on new wage and hour schedules. Association officials contended the scales proposed by the union would increase apple and pear prices 25 cents a box. The union denied the scale was excessive, asserting it was on a parity with that already accepted by other packing organizations.

SALEM, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Five fatalities and 1,135 accidents were reported during the week ending yesterday to the state industrial accident commission. Fatalities were: Ray W. Kelly, Banks, choker setter, injured July 29 at Banks; E. H. Schroeder, Reedsport timber faller, injured July 22 at Reedsport; L. G. Griffin, Yamhill carrier driver, injured July 26 at Yamhill; A. L. Hawk, Prineville check scaler, injured July 26 at Prineville; E. H. Freese, Bonanza farm worker, injured July 29 at Bonanza.
