SONS INSTITUTE AND HOMECOMING SET FOR OCT. 29-30

SOUTHERN OREGON STATE NORMAL SCHOOL, Ashland, Aug. 6.—(Sp.)—The third annual teachers' institute and educational conference in conjunction with alumni homecoming, have been set for the weekend of October 29 and 30, 1937, at the Southern Oregon State Normal school in Ashland.

The teachers' institute and conference, the third of its kind to be held on the normal school campus, sponsored by the counties of Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Lake and the Southern Oregon State Normal school, is expected to draw 1,000 teachers from these and adjoining counties.

Dr. Paul McKee of the Colorado State College of Education at Greeley who was so popular at the conference in April, 1936, has been secured for lectures and discussions, as have other prominent educators in the Pacific northwest.

The institute program will cover the 29th and 30th of the month, with C. R. Bowman, Jackson county school superintendent; Fred Peterson, Klamath county superintendent of schools; H. H. Wardrip, Josephine county superintendent; Mrs. Anne Sprague, superintendent of schools in Lake county, and President Walter Redford of the normal school as executive committee.

Homecoming of the normal school graduates is to be in conjunction with the conference this year for the convenience of the school alumni who are teaching in southern Oregon. The festivities will be initiated with a banquet, followed by a play presented by the normal school, both open to conference attendees and non-graduates of the school, on the evening of the 29th.

A football game on the local field Saturday afternoon will be featured on the homecoming program, followed by an alumni "mixer" in the evening.

COOLER WEATHER BOON TO OUTINGS IN FOREST AREAS

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue river national forest headquarters:

"Cooler weather in the mountainous areas, with fishing from good to fair, promises many refreshing outings during the week-end.

"At Lake of the Woods swimming conditions are ideal. Many silver-side trout, ranging from 12 to 18 inches, are being taken by still fishing at the south end. At Fourmile lake, silver-sides are biting well but not many eastern brook are being caught.

The state game commission planted fish in the south fork of Little Butte creek last week.

"Fair catches are being made in a few tributaries of the upper Rogue river, with the best luck in Union creek and Mill creek. Good catches are being made in the main river in the vicinity of the log jam two miles above the Browns Cabin road. Both grasshoppers and cluster salmon eggs have met with fair results and some anglers are using small spinners with worms.

"Fishing and swimming are good in the Big Applegate and its tributaries, where the water has been exceptionally clear for the past two weeks. Good catches have been reported taken in the evenings by the use of flies.

"In the Butte Falls district, fishing is fair in Mid lake, Grass lake and Cliff lake of the Seven lakes group, and in the middle and south forks of the Rogue. Grayhackle and salmon flies have been very effective in these two streams but no catches of any size have been reported from the smaller streams of the district north to the Blue Canyon lakes.

"Huckleberries at Huckleberry mountain are now beginning to ripen but picking will not be good until about August 15. In the Dead Indian district, the crop does not appear to be very promising but a few are already ripening on the southwest side of Brown mountain and south of the Dead Indian road along the Cascade summit.

"One man-caused fire occurred in the Rogue river national forest during the past week, which fortunately was confined to an area of four acres. Unfavorably low humidity and prevailing winds make conditions hazardous at this time and extreme care is urged for all those going into the forest."

CORVALLIS RITES FOR ELLENBURG

The body of State Police Sergeant William H. Ellenburg, who died Wednesday afternoon of a heart attack, was sent to Corvallis last night by train. A full military funeral will be held from the Keeney funeral home in that city tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock.

Members of local state police headquarters, to which Sergeant Ellenburg had been attached for the past five years, paid their last respects to their departed friend and fellow officer. A guard of honor escorted the body from the Keeney funeral home to the depot, and stood with uncovered heads as it was placed aboard for transfer to his old home town.

Those composing the guard of honor were Sergeant H. W. Howard and Privates J. C. Johnson, A. E. Stoehr, Frank Beers and Clark Johnson of the Medford office, and Sergeant O. A. MacKinnon of Klamath Falls.

Sergeant H. W. Howard and Private J. C. Johnson were to leave Medford today to take part in final services at Corvallis tomorrow morning. With 14 other state police officers from all parts of Oregon, they will form a guard of honor at the funeral.

Build Mansion
HONOLULU (UP)—Paris Duke Cronwell, wealthy tobacco heir, has taken out the permit for the construction of her \$300,000 home here. The shoreline property on which it will be erected cost her \$100,000 more. The Cronwells expect to spend six months of each year here.

SCENIC HIGHWAY ON COAST OPENED

MONTEREY, Cal. (UP)—Heretofore almost inaccessible parts of the United States are being steadily made accessible to the automobile and travelers generally.

One hundred and forty miles of rugged California coastline, little changed since the early days almost 400 years ago when Spanish navigators sailed hesitatingly along its forbidden shores, has been opened to motorists between Carmel on the Monterey bay and San Simeon, just above Los Angeles.

The new highway, recently completed at a cost of almost \$20,000,000, provides a new pleasure route between San Francisco and Los Angeles by way of Del Monte and the Monterey peninsula. It makes accessible to modern traffic almost the last stretch of California's coastal wilderness which heretofore had only been attainable on horse-back or afoot.

The road for the most part edges the Pacific, which is viewed from a thousand angles in as many lights and moods with towering wooded mountains once inhabited by Indians and infested with outlaws as a backdrop.

At Big Sur, 30 miles south of Del Monte, the road leaves the coast line for a few miles to wander among the redwoods and the state park in which they are included.

The roadway is regarded by many as one of the most scenic in the world.
