

WANTS TO LEASE BRAZIL WARSHIPS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Chairman Walsh (D., Mass.) of the senate naval affairs committee proposed today that the navy be authorized to lease six destroyers to the Brazilian government. Walsh explained to the senate that the Brazilian government was "concerned with certain tendencies in the world political situation" and was trying to build up a "modest navy." The state department, he said, believed it would be better for this country to lease naval craft to Brazil than from the assistance to come from other powers. The destroyers involved, Walsh said, were over-age and out of commission.
