

Indian Wonder Boy Meets Kohen in Main Grappling Event Tonight

ESTES AND LARUE WILL SWAP GRIPS IN MIDDLE MATCH

Savich and Mexican Renew Feud in Opener — Rodriguez Vows to Even Score for Past Indignities

Sammy Kohen, New York city's cocky little Jewish grappler and Frankie Clemens, Indian "wonder boy" from Oklahoma, face each other in the main event of Promoter Mack Lillard's weekly program under the stars at the high school tonight. One of the year's largest crowds is expected.

In the middle event, Toots Estes returns to local warfare to tangle with the villainous Jack LaRue, Kansas City terror, and in the opener, Danny Savich faces the Mexican "hot tamale," Carlos Rodriguez. Toy Aho of Finland, who formerly grappled here, will be third man in the ring.

From beginning to end, it will be clean and scientific, with Savich, LaRue and Kohen representing the dirt brigade and Rodriguez, Estes and Clemens upholding the honor of those who do their work in the orthodox manner.

Opener of Interest. Although billed as the opener, the Savich-Rodriguez squabble seems to be causing the greatest furor among Medford's wrestling fans. It is a rematch from last week during which Savich, making his first local appearance in several months, went meanie on the boys and slapped and battered the roly-poly Mexican from pillar to post before ending things. It was a surprise to all and caused to see the formerly popular Rodriguez cut loose with foul tactics. Previous to that display, Savich had always been a perfect gentleman. After the match, Danny remarked that he wasn't going to let any low brow Mexican whip him.

Angered by Savich's verbal outburst, Rodriguez, a clean wrestler, begged Promoter Lillard for another fight at the ex-University of Utah center in the main event. Rodriguez has vowed that he will make Savich eat his words, so the match should prove the highlight of an expected excellent card.

Clemens Undefeated. Kohen, a villain of the first water, will attempt to crack Frankie Clemens' string of consecutive victories in southern Oregon in the main event. Both hold wins over the Black Dragon and both are rated close to the top of all grapplers now appearing locally.

Extremely popular Toots Estes, former champion of the Hawaiian Islands, will return after a prolonged absence to meet the rough and tough Jack LaRue in the middle go. It will be a hammerlock, of which LaRue is a past master, versus dropkick and sunnemberg, two of Estes' pet maneuvers.

First two matches will be staged under the Australian fall system, consisting of six 10-minute rounds or the best two out of three falls, while the main event will be for a one hour time limit.

RIFLEMEN READY FOR LARGER GUNS

PUBLIC LINKS PLAYERS FIRE OPENING SHOTS IN NATIONAL TITLE TRIALS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The pick of the country's public links talent, as swashbuckling a crew as ever chopped out a divot, fired the opening shots today in the start of the 16th annual national golf championship.

Nearly 200 stars from the public courses of 61 cities and representing 24 states, the territory of Hawaii and the district of Columbia, unnumbered their clubs for the first 18 of the 36-hole qualifying trials.

They'll be at it again Tuesday, with the top 64 scorers continuing for the match play rounds which start the following day. Friday's semifinals and Saturday's finals will be over the 36-hole route with 18-hole rounds set for mornings and afternoons from Wednesday through Thursday.

The field brought out players from every walk of life—college students, mechanics, clerks, truck drivers, even down to policemen.

Handsome B. Patrick Abbott, who does a bit of movie acting as a Hollywood extra and plays superior golf on the side, headed the starting field as defending champion.

He won the crown last year in a par blasting drive that took the measure of Haberdasher Clerk Claude Rippy of Washington, D. C.

CRATERS DEFEAT PIRATES 10 TO 5 TO STAY IN RACE

Locals Take Early Lead With Heavy Slugging — Hughes Relieves Erickson in Sixth — Lewis Homes in Sixth — Lewis Homes

Frank ("Donny") Donovan belted three doubles and a triple and Dick Lewis crashed a home run to give young Ray Erickson, Medford right-hander, his first southern Oregon league victory of the year against Roseburg yesterday at the high school field. The score was 10-5. The encounter saw the Craters retain a gambling chance at the second-half pennant while the Pirates were dropping their fifth straight to sink deep into the circuit cellar.

Although slaying the jinx that had dogged him since the season opened, Erickson was none too effective. He tolled five innings and was touched for that many runs and eight hits before Manager Mike Bockovic, taking no chances, sent Jack Hughes to the mound in the sixth inning. In a great exhibition, Hughes wheeled his high hard one past four Pirate batters for the third strike, allowed only one hit and no runs the remainder of the game.

Craters Score Early. Erickson showed signs of weakening in the fifth inning when Roseburg punched five singles for three runs, after scoring twice in the second. Terrific batting by his teammates, however, had accounted for nine tallies in the second, third and fourth, and Erickson left the game with the score 9-5 in his favor. With Hughes showing his old-time form, the Craters coasted in, adding another marker in the eighth for good measure.

The Craters lost little time in getting to the side-arm, fast ball and curve of Manager George Barr of the Pirates. They tallied four times in the second, with Erickson, himself driving in the first two. Sakrada singled to left, George Gitzen drew a walk, and both advanced a base as Acheson was being thrown out. Erickson then dropped a Texas league noona from shortstop scoring Sakrada and Gitzen.

Lewis Homes. Dick Lewis, next up, found an inside fast ball to his liking and whammed a tremendous drive down the left field foul line. It landed far past the outfielder and only a few feet in fair territory, and Lewis made the complete circuit behind Erickson.

Four safeties in the third inning produced three more runs. Donovan tripled down the third base line and spiked the plate when Hoffard dropped a "bleeder" double into right. Bob Smith singled off First Baseman Mardini's chest, Hoffard going to third. Smith stole second and they both scored when Russ Acheson singled sharply to centerfield.

Roseburg got its first two runs in their half of the third frame as the Crater infield momentarily cracked wide open. Domenico and Barr both reached first base when Rickert booted their ground balls. Hill hit to Donovan, the latter tagging out Domenico going into third, and Hill reached first on the fielder's choice. Robertson smashed one at Smith who started a reverse double play that didn't pan out. He threw to Lewis at second, forcing Hill out the shortstop's return throw was wild and Barr scored while Robertson went to second. Shinn then singled to right, scoring Robertson. Dick Sakrada took Goff's long fly to end the inning.

Two More In Fourth. With the score 7-2, the Craters tallied twice more in the fourth to insure victory. Lewis, first up, rescinded first on an infield error. Rickert whipped a red-hot single into centerfield that skidded between Shinn's legs and enabled Lewis to race home. Rickert pulled up at third, and after Donovan had popped out, Hoffard singled hotly to centerfield scoring Rickert.

Roseburg tried desperately to get in the ball game in the fifth. Domenico, Hill, Robertson, Goff and Mardini all belted singles for a total of three runs, but the outburst was naught. Jack Hughes took over in the next stanza, and from then on out the Pirates were completely at his mercy.

A walk to Hughes, two force plays and Donovan's third two-base hit of the afternoon accounted for the tenth and final Medford tally in the eighth inning.

Good Support. Although the Crater infield committed four errors, it gave Erickson and Hughes some sensational support. The Lewis to Rickert to Smith double play combination clicked twice to relieve pressure on Erickson. Sakrada, in centerfield, also nailed down two dangerous looking drives.

NEGROES AND TEXANS STAGE FREE FOR ALL IN BASEBALL TOURNEY

DENVER, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The Negro All-Stars their latest victory marked by a free-for-all with Texas ball players, and the Duncan, Okla., Halliburton will clash tonight for the winner's purse in the Denver Post baseball tournament.

If the negroes win the first game the title is theirs as they are undefeated in six games while Duncan has won three and lost one.

Should the Oklahomans, who won the national semipro tournament championship at Wichita last year triumph, the teams will play another game immediately after the opener.

They are sole survivors of a field of 16 clubs, representing six states, which started the grind July 29. The negroes—they are professionals from the Negro National league while the other teams entered were semi-outsider-defeated the Pampa, Texas, Oilers, 10 to 1, yesterday in a contest interrupted by a melee involving most of the players on both sides.
