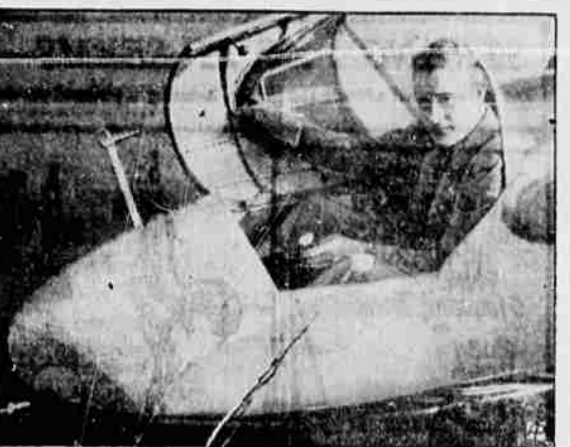

It seems like everyone wanted to see Miss Harlow's last screen production, "Saratoza," which opened yesterday at the Craterian Theater. Record crowds for matinee and evening shows set up new box office records and were treated to some highly entertaining film fare.

There are two ways of looking at "Saratoza." One is the fact that it is Miss Harlow's final appearance. Second is the unmistakable fact that it is a rousing entertainment. Interesting people are constantly being and doing interesting things in interesting places. In the starring role with Miss Harlow is Clark Gable, with whom she made her first bids for stardom. The cast also includes Lionel Barrymore, Frank Morgan, Walter Pidgeon, Una Merkel, and Cliff Edwards to mention a few of the better known players.

With Barrymore as the old southern gent of the old school, portraying the part of Miss Harlow's grandfather—and doing it in the style that has won him countless admirers; with Frank Morgan and Una Merkel contributing much comedy; Cliff Edwards adding to the laughs; nevertheless it is Harlow, Gable and Pidgeon who carry the show on the whole. Directly the story revolves itself into a battle of wits between Miss Harlow and Gable, both of whom deliver characterizations certain to be classed as among their best.
