KOHNEN AND INDIAN DIVIDE HONORS IN MAIN MAT BATTLE

Sammy Kohnen of New York City and Frankie Clemens of Oklahoma, two of promoter Mack Lillard's very toughest grapplers, went 60 hectic minutes in the main event at the high school arena last night, and when it was all said and done, the boys staggered to their corners with honors even. Each grabbed one fall in the ding-dong battle.

Toots Eaten returned after a long absence to surprise villainous Jack LaRue in two straight tumbles in the middle event and Danny Savich fouled his way to an unpopular win over Carlos Rodriguez in the opening squabble.

The Kohnen-Clemens dog-fight, which was previously figured by addicts to be not so hot, turned out to be one of the warmest affairs witnessed here in many moons. It was the first match in a long time that went the entire time limit, and the two received an ovation as they drooped their way to the dressing room, both considerably the worse for wear.

Kohnen, mixing foul tactics with really great grappling, manufactured the first tumble after over 44 minutes of strenuous work on the part of both boys. Clemens cut loose with three counterpunches the last of which missed fire, and the New York Jew promptly slapped on his painful leg-breaker to get Referee Toy Aho's nod. Until that point, it was all Kohnen, and he deserved the fall. For fully 25 minutes he applied the pressure on a pinching headlock, a maneuver that forced Clemens on the defensive at all times.

The Indian, still befuddled, hoped on his bicycle until his head cleared and then roared off the ropes to win the second fall in 8:53. He won it with what he termed the Indian Bow-Knot, one of the most peculiar holds ever displayed here. He grabbed Kohnen's hands, pulled his arms through his legs, and stood him on his shoulder blades. Helpless as a baby, Kohnen couldn't make a move to break the hold.

In the remaining seven minutes of wrestling time, both boys tried desperately to take the deciding fall, but both were too tired to do much damage.

Only three times did Clemens attempt to use his famous Indian paralyzer, and only once did he really clamp it on the Jew. However, Kohnen managed to break loose and hit for the ropes. The other two times, Kohnen squirmed for the strands at the first sign of what was coming.

Toots Eaten, flashier than ever, used sonnerberg's in the third round to pin LaRue and ended the match in the fourth frame with sonnerberg's and a rebounding scissor. It was a tough, dirty match, with LaRue pulling everything in the book in an attempt to clamp on his effective hammerlock. He did just once but Toots managed to wriggle out.

Danny Savich beat Carlos Rodriguez, Mexico's "hot tamale," in the third round with a well-aimed elbow to the button, a blow that knocked the Mexican to the floor outside the ring and also, unconscious, Savich was given the first fall in the second round after applying a figure eight leg-breaker, but Referee Aho reversed his decision when the dirty Danny refused to break the hold, and awarded the tumble to Rodriguez on a foul.

Ending the match, Savich grabbed Rodriguez by the hair and hurled him through the ropes. The Mexican landed on his head outside the ring and just managed to stagger back at the count of 18. Again Savich heaved the "hot tamale" outside the arena and again Rodriguez attempted to climb back in. As he was about to throw a leg through the strands and continue, Savich let fly a right-foot kick that landed flush on the Rodriguez chin, catapulting him to the feet of ringiders, and wound up proceedings. Rodriguez was out so cold that 10 minutes later he had to be carried to the dressing room.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—(AP)—America's leading public links competitors swung out over the Harding golf course today on the final 18 holes of qualifying play.

Out of a field of nearly 200 entrants, 54 low-scorers will emerge by nightfall to go into the tournament medal play starting tomorrow for the national public links championship.

Heading the procession into today's round was Don Erickson of Alhambra, Calif., ex-newsboy and now a gas company handyman, Erickson went around the long Harding course yesterday in 67-55 shots under par.

A veteran of five previous national public campaigns, the 25-year-old Swede climaxed his performance with a 35-foot putt on the 18th green, the tent time he had one-putted.

Two strokes back was Joe Greene, Philadelphia automobile factory employee, who clipped three strokes off par for a 33 on the trip out and took a 36 coming back.

Pat Abbott, slender defending champion from Pasadena, posted 33-37-70, while three others, Van Hill of Long Beach, Calif., Robert Abeles, Jr., Santa Monica, Calif., and Paul Genung, Dayton, O., completed the par-cracking brigade with 71s.

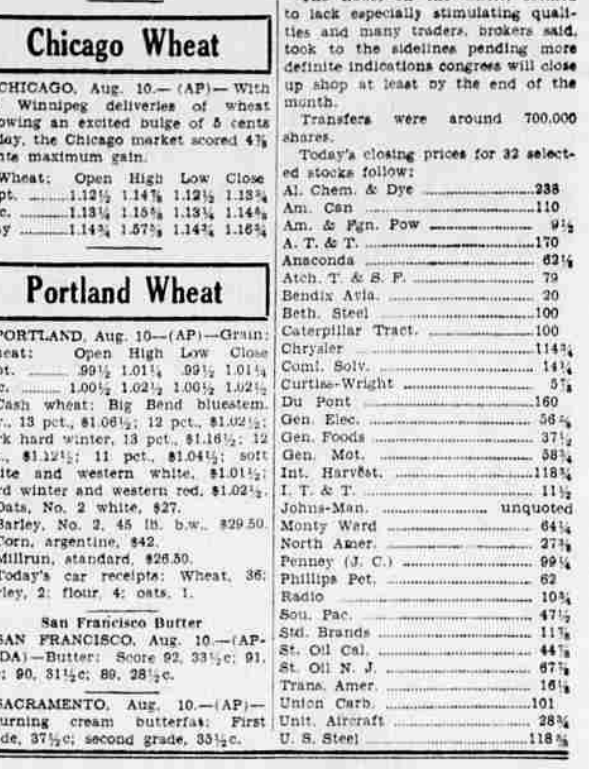
