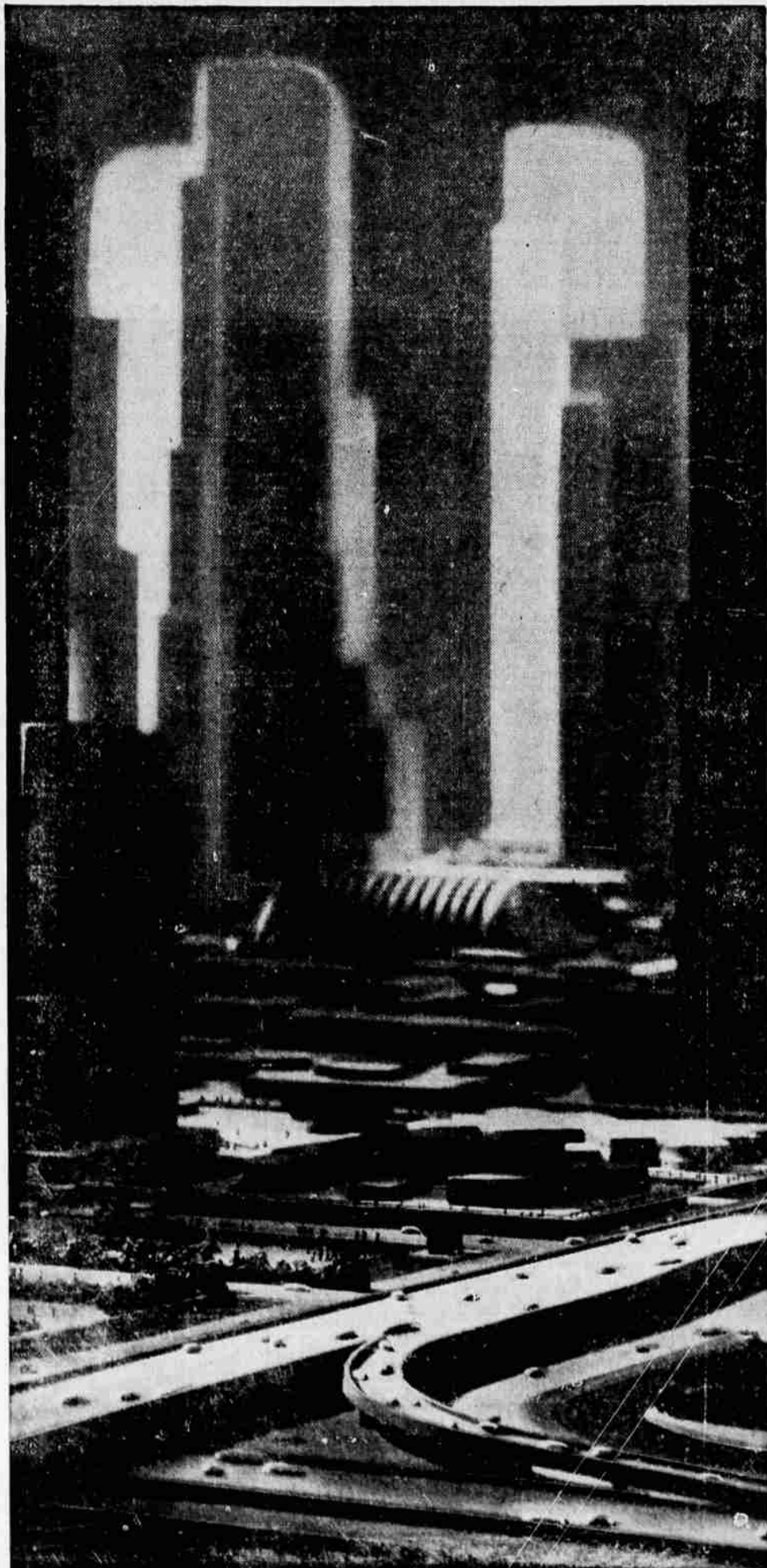
Word was received by Mrs. L. H. Hughes from Miss Betty Gentry that she was sailing on the S. S. Lurline for Honolulu and would be married July 28.
