

LOCAL NATIONAL GUARDS ENTRAIN MONDAY FOR CAMP

Company A and headquarters company, 186th Infantry of the Oregon National Guard will leave here on a special train at midnight Monday for two weeks of intensive training at Fort Lewis, Wash.

The local guardsmen will go directly to Camp Murray, part of Fort Lewis. They will participate in 4th army maneuvers, being part of defending forces which will endeavor to stop an invasion of "enemy" troops from the north.

Both Medford companies will report at the armory at 1:00 p. m. tomorrow for a regular paid drill and final preparations for departure to camp. They will entrain at 9 p. m. their special train to be on a siding near the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. Capt. Carl Y. Tengwald, commanding Company A, will be train commander.

The train is scheduled to arrive at Camp Murray at 4:30 p. m. Tuesday. Mess will be served on the train en route.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Bruce McCormick, a Los Angeles fireman who plays golf with the thoroughness of a four-alarm blaze, became the 1937 national public links champion today with a one up 36-hole victory over his fairway buddy, Don Erickson of Alhambra, Cal.

The southern California "smoke eater," a lean blonde fellow with a bag full of fancy shots, stabbed the ball into the cup for a first hole par 4. It gave him a lead he held until the match ended on the 96th green.

He was 4 up at the ninth; 3 up at the eighteenth and 4 up again at the 27th. His medal score was not up to his efforts throughout the rest of the tournament but it was sufficient to hold Erickson in check from start to finish.

McCormick posted a 35, one under par, for the first nine; took an approximate 42, six over par for the second nine, and carded a 37 for the third leg of the trip.

Erickson, the husky gas works employee, whose 36-hole medal score of 139 equalled the record of the sixteen year old tournament, was badly off his usual game.

COUNTY 4-H CLUBS PLAN HANDICRAFT FAIR THIS WEEK

Jackson county's 4-H clubs will hold a home economics and handicraft fair at the courthouse auditorium at 10 o'clock next Friday morning and lasting through Saturday.

Considerable interest is being shown by members, 75 entries having been received thus far from all parts of the county.

At 10 o'clock Friday morning judging of exhibits will start. Saturday will be devoted to demonstrations in cooking, canning and clothing. Special contests this year will be the preparation of a dinner for four persons for \$1. The girls will be allowed three hours to prepare, serve and clear away the dinner, which must not cost more than one dollar. The other new contest will be the girls' style dress review, which will consist of modeling of complete costumes, selected and made by club members.

The judging contest, also to be held Saturday, in which all members may compete, will decide the winning team to go to the state fair in September to represent Jackson county.

Anyone interested in the 4-H club work is invited to come and see the exhibits and the demonstrations.

FEHL ELIGIBLE TO RETURN TONIGHT

The parole of Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge, sentenced to serve four years in state prison for conviction of ballot-theft conspiracy, expires at midnight Sunday after which under the terms of a parole granted by Governor Charles H. Martin, he can return here.

Fehl, according to county authorities will attend and be a witness in the jury trial Monday, of the civil action of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Corlinda E. Stalley against the estate of Ted Heinrich, for collection of \$3400 allegedly due under a rental agreement. Fehl is not a party in the action, but is a former part-owner of the building involved.

The case will be heard by Circuit Judge E. B. Ashurst of Klamath Falls.
