

POUGHKEEPSIE GOLFER SETS FAST PACE FOR TOURNAMENT WARM-UP

PORTLAND, Aug. 19.—(AP)—All the old and famous hands dropping into Portland for the national amateur golf tournament next week were worried from today when they learned Ray Billow of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., snatched out a 68 on the Alderwood country club course.

The New York state champion was out in 34 and back in the same number of strokes yesterday during a practice round in preparation for the opening of the tournament Monday.

Johnny Goodman of Omaha, former open champion, took just enough time to change his clothes after stepping off the train and then played 18 holes in 71—one under par. Freddie Haas, Louisiana State university star and national collegiate champion, wound up his round with a 72.

Northwest golf followers cheered for a home-town lad today when they learned Frank Dolp, former western champion, would compete. Dolp was a top Portland golfer until he entered business at San Francisco a few years ago. Failure of one of the northern California entrants to take his place gave Dolp his opportunity.

wouldn't have looked too good to the deer public and which he neither mentioned nor forgot. Had these colleagues launched their shafts at him, he had quite as much to give in return.

Some congressmen have grown a little sensitive about adjournment. There has been a lot of talk about the "long vacations" of members of congress, as compared with those usually enjoyed by mere mortals.

In response to these digs, there have been threats to read into the record the vacation schedules of some of the big industrial concerns.

Three large corporations, supposed to be "typical," allow two weeks vacation to employees who have been in their service five years. Others vary from the E. I. DuPont de Nemours company's policy of granting two weeks after a year's employment to Weirton Steel, at the other end of the rainbow which grants two days for those who have been employed a year six days for those with five to ten years' service and ten days for those who have stuck more than 15 years.

Irate farmers took a long look at an elaborate treasury document, printed expressly for the president and congress, and grew hoarse under the collar. It is a 370-page book, minutely indexed, and it shows just where every dollar of relief expenditure goes. This tale-telling tome is the work of the highly efficient division of accounts and deposits of the treasury.

What irked the farmers and their friends was the figure of \$1,734,614,048, the total allocation of relief expenditures to date in three industrial states, New York, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, making up about 25 percent of the grand total for all states, which amounts to over six billion.

New York state alone received, during the last two years, \$900,000,000 out of which WPA in New York City spent over \$400,000,000 under the sponsorship of various agencies of the city, state and federal governments.

The treasury document came out about the time the papers carried side by side two steps taken by the house appropriations committee. One turned down a \$20,000,000 expenditure to aid tenant farmers (already authorized by congress), and the other voted over \$10,000,000 for the Grand Central post office in New York (for which the federal government was already obligated) and a \$3,000,000 contribution to the New York world's fair.
