GOLFING GREATS COME SUNDAY TO HONOR CHAN EGAN

In the form of a beautiful granite drinking fountain, displaying a bronze plaque with an appropriate inscription. Through the years, the fountain will stand as a symbol to one of America's most beloved golfers and sportsmen.

Assisting the famous Jones in the memorial fountain dedication will be Grantland Rice, foremost sports writer of America, John G. Jackson of New York city, president of the United States Golf association, Paul Pierini, president of the Northwest Amateur Golf association, and C. J. Simon and Leonard Carpenter, officials of the Rogue Valley Golf club. All will give short talks on the life of Egan.

At 11 a. m., all golfers and interested persons will have the opportunity of witnessing Harry Cooper, Lawson Little and Jimmy Thomson demonstrate every golf shot in the book. Of special interest to players will be the form of Thomson as he hammers tee shots for 300 and more yards. He is rated the longest hitter off the tee in present day golf.

Horton Smith, champion money player of 1936, will accompany the shot-making demonstration with explanation of all action.

Bobby Jones, the only golfer in history to sweep both the British and American amateur and open tournaments the same year and undisputedly the top performer of all time, will not display his talents. He retired from tournament play several years ago to practice law in Atlanta, Ga., and since then has trod the fairways only as a pastime. However because Chan Egan was his close friend and because he desires to make a permanent gesture toward the fond memory he has for Egan, he will be in Medford to take charge of the dedication ceremony.

The appearance of so many national golf notables Monday is undoubtedly the greatest athletic attraction ever staged in southern Oregon, if not in the entire state, and indicates, more than anything else could, the extreme popularity of Egan in the world of golf.

Chandler Egan died in Everett, Wash., April 8, 1936, at the age of 31. He had gone there to design a golf course for the American Legion Memorial park and failed to rally to treatment after contracting pneumonia.

His first major golf title came in 1904 at Baltusrol while he was still an undergraduate at Harvard. He won America's most coveted prize—the national amateur—by defeating Fred Herreshoff in the final, 8 and 6. Coming back the following year, he downed D. E. Sawyer of Chicago, 6 and 5, to again top the country's amateurs. Twenty years later, in 1929, he started the sports world by reaching the semi-finals of the national amateur at Pebble Beach, Cal. It was the same year that Johnny Goodman, then an unknown, eliminated the great Bobby Jones in the quarter-finals. In 1934, by sensational golf, Egan shot his way to membership on the American Walker cup team which defeated the British. Gained Many Honors.

Other titles won by Egan during his long and colorful career were the Western amateur four times, the Pacific Northwest amateur five times, and the California state amateur in 1926.

During his later life and while still playing tournament golf, Egan turned his talents toward the designing and planning of golf courses throughout the nation, and at his death was one of the foremost golf architects in the nation. He drew the plans for the Bobby Jones course in Atlanta and designed many others in all parts of the country. He came to Medford in 1910 and made his home here until his death.

It was he, almost entirely, who was responsible for Medford being one of the first cities in Oregon to boast an 18-hole golf course. While he was known to the outside world chiefly as a golfer and a sportsman, here in Medford he was known as a loyal citizen and a friend, as well.

Expect Large Throng. Officials of the Rogue Valley Golf club have made final plans to stage the memorial fountain dedication and take care of the expected huge crowd. Marshals have been appointed to patrol the fairways and greens during the exhibition match. All automobiles possible will be parked inside the grounds, with the oration being routed to a nearby field. A loudspeaker sound truck will be on hand to keep the spectators informed as to all action during the day.

Officials once more request that all wearers of the Egan memorial buttons, which are taking the place of tickets, display their badges prominently so that there will be a minimum of crowding at the gate.

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Southern Oregon paid tribute today to Queen Gladys, symbolizing the colorful gladiolus fields which annually bring a \$300,000 crop to the district.

Shirley Riebel was crowned queen this morning and cut the rope of gladiolus opening the way to the two-day exhibit.

Buyers from the coast and from the east formed an important part of the visitors, for 28 freight carloads of bulbs were shipped last year. In conjunction with the show, sponsored by the Grants Pass Gladiolus society, the Northwest Gladiolus association of Oregon and Washington is meeting. Officers of the California association are attending unofficially.
