

Medford and Klamath Tangle Tonight for Softball Championship

TIMBERMEN TRIM ASHLAND 9-1 AS K. F. DOWNS G. P.

Locals Ice Game in First Two Stanzas by Six-Run Onslaught — Homers Enliven K. F.-G. P. Contest

Game Tonight. (District Championship Final) Medford vs. Klamath Falls (8 p.m.)

Timber Products of Medford and Smoke of Klamath Falls, southern Oregon's finest softball teams, will face off at the high school stadium tonight for the championship of state district 14 and the right to enter the tournament at Salem starting next Monday. Timber Products won their right to enter the finals by defeating Ashland, 9-1, last night while Klamath Falls pinched off the Bowers of Grants Pass, 8-7. Earl Dale, who allowed Ashland only two hits last night, will be on the Timber Products mound. He will be opposed by Harry Griffith for the Klamath Falls club.

Locals Start Early. An 11-hit attack on Bill Hoxie, Ashland hurler, gave Medford's champions their win last night before 1500 roaring fans. Luman, Van Dyke, Hamrick and Smith all belted two hits in four trips to pace the offense outburst, and Stine contributed a triple. Timber Products sewed up the game in the first two innings by scoring six runs and Dale, fanning 8 and issuing no walks, protected the lead from then on out. The victory proved extremely costly to Timber Products when Dick Lewis, shortstop, ripped a long gash in his leg while sliding into third base in the fourth inning. The wound necessitated 12 stitches and will end his ball playing for this year. A spike used to nail the canvas to the turf was the cause of the injury. Malcolm Stone will hold down shortstop tonight.

Homers Enliven Game. Klamath Falls won its battle with Grants Pass despite two home runs by Jackson, Grants Pass centerfielder, which came in the eighth and ninth innings with the bases empty. Hamrick, Smoke rightfielder, blasted a homer in the fifth with two bases aboard and the score tied, 2-2, to provide the victory spark. Roy Wheeler, shortstop and Harry Griffith, pitcher, both got three hits to pace the Klamathites.

Crom, Grants Pass windmill hurler, fanned 9, but gave up 11 base knocks while Griffith was keeping his 7 hits fairly well scattered. He struck out 6.

CRATERS TANGLE WITH CRESCENTS HERE ON SUNDAY

Replay of Three Innings in Protested Game Set for 1:30—Regular Game to Follow—Title at Stake

Climaxing an inspired drive that has seen them blast their way into a tie for the leadership, Medford's crashing Craters meet the powerful Crescent City Chinooks here Sunday in the final game of the second-half Southern Oregon league schedule. It will be Crescent City's one and only Medford appearance of the year.

Action will open at 1:30 o'clock with the two clubs starting the replay of the July 18 game at Crescent City which was protested by Medford, and which E. H. Lamport, president of the league, ordered replayed from the sixth inning on, at which point the protested play occurred.

Can Clinch Title. After the toughest stretch battle in many years, the second-half pennant can be clinched by either Medford or Crescent City. A double victory for either club Sunday will give it the undisputed championship. If the two teams divide and Ashland knocks over Glendale at Glendale, a triple tie for first place will exist and a playoff become necessary.

Manager Mike Balkovick, who has led the Craters to a contending position for the first time in years, has nominated big Jack Hughes for mound duty in the regular league battle. The fast-balling righthander pitched the locals into a first-place tie last Sunday by beating Grants Pass, 7-6, in 10 innings, and Balkovick is confident that he can walk the coast team.

Expect Throng. Largest crowd of the year is expected to pack the stands at the high school turf field for these games that will probably decide the league championship. Of especial interest to local fans will be the appearance of Orville Framsted, sensational centerfielder for Crescent City. Framsted, only 18 years old, is leading the circuit in batting with a mark of .444 and is considered one of the most promising youngsters ever developed in the Southern Oregon league.

Man for man, Crescent City is figured the finest team in the loop. It won the first-half championship with eight straight victories and has been defeated only by Ashland this half. Besides the protested game, Medford and Crescent City have met only once before, with the Chinooks winning in the last half of the ninth inning when Framsted stole home with the deciding run.
