NANKING.—(P)—In an effort to cut China's annual tuberculosis death rate of 1,600,000, welfare organizations here have embarked on a spectacular campaign. Exhibitions, posters and newspaper ads are being used. Since 6 percent of the nation's 400,000 high school students suffer from the white plague, the education ministry, as its share in the campaign, has instituted a program of compulsory athletics. Excessive indoor study has fostered the disease, officials believe. They have ordered all schools closed at 3 p. m.
