

NAMING OF STATE DEMO CHAIRMAN POLITICAL CLIMAX

Six Prominent Bourbons Eager to Fill McCulloch's Post — Claim Snell Will Run in Steiwer's Place

SALEM, Aug. 24.—(P)—The climax of a summer full of political activity, something unusual in an off-year, is expected to occur within two or three weeks when a successor must be named for Claude McCulloch, Democratic state chairman who will resign his post before becoming federal district judge.

Democratic leaders assume McCulloch, after his return from Washington, D. C., will call the 38 state committeemen together and will tender his resignation. But if McCulloch does not call a meeting, Nedie Strayer of Baker county, vice chairman, would rise to the post for the rest of the term.

Six prominent Democrats are reported to be after McCulloch's job. One of the leading candidates is John Beckman, Multnomah county chairman, who is reported to have dropped from the bandwagon of Governor Martin.

Beckman's entry in the race is construed to mean that W. L. Gosselin, secretary to Governor Martin and past president of the Young Democrats of Oregon, will not be a candidate, as the two are close friends. Gosselin is expected back in a few days from Indianapolis, where he attended the national convention of Young Democrats.

Other candidates include U. S. Burr of Corvallis, Jack Cauffield of Tillamook county, Walter B. Gleason of Portland, Jack Allen of Pendleton and A. M. Delrymple, tax collection deputy in the Marion county sheriff's office.

The Oregon Democrat, party publication, comes forward with a charge that "the big-wigs of the Republican high command" plan to run Secretary of State Earl Snell for U. S. senator, asserting that Senator Steiwer will not run.

The publication says the Republicans feel that Snell is a better vote getter than Steiwer, and thus would make a better race against Willis Mahoney, said to be the Democratic hope for Steiwer's position.

Snell remains close-mouthed about his political ambitions, but persons close to him assert he plans to run again for secretary of state.

HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER ON JAUNT TO BAKER

Rev. Sam Morris will be heard at the Methodist Episcopal church, corner of Main and Laurel, Thursday at 7:45 p. m. in a nation-wide crusade against liquor.

Three years ago, while pastor of the First Baptist church of Stamford, Texas, Mr. Morris began his crusade against the liquor traffic

over the radio. Three times daily he was heard over a powerful radio station, reaching every state in the Union with his stirring appeal.

Mr. Morris is said to be one of the spokesmen most feared by the brewery and distilling interests of the nation. He has been heard by throngs during his nation-wide appearances covering 32 states. He comes to Medford under auspices of the National Voice. Locally he is appearing under sponsorship of the Ministerial association and the W. C. T. U., with other affiliate temperance organizations.

THIRD SPRAY DUE FOR CODLING MOTH

The third cover spray, for control of second brood codling moth, on apples and heavily infested late pears, especially Bose, should be completed on August 28, according to C. B. Coody, assistant county agent, and L. O. Gentner, entomologist, Southern Oregon experiment station.

A moderately heavy flight of codling moth has made this spray necessary. Where good control has been obtained in the past, very little added control would be obtained by an additional spray at this time.

Use three pounds of arsenate of lead and 1/3 to 1/4 pound of spreader per 100 gallons of water.

KROSCHEL SEEKING BREWERY RECEIVER

S. A. Kroschel has filed suit in circuit court against the Gold Seal Creamery company, the Southern Oregon Brewing company, R. Edwards, John Malatchi, and Haslett Warehouse

company, seeking judgment against the Gold Seal Creamery company for \$26,340, allegedly due on a mortgage, held by the First National bank, the appointment of a receiver for the operation of the Southern Oregon Brewery, and the sale of the property, as prescribed by law, the purchaser to take immediate possession.

It is set forth in the complaint that there are now in process of brewing approximately 1,200 kegs of beer and that if the brew is allowed to go uncare for it will spoil, causing deterioration of rats and containers.

Kroschel, former owner of the property, sold it four years ago, moving to San Diego, Cal.
