PINBALL ARREST INVITED TO TEST LEGALITY OF BAN

It is further held "that when the city of Medford has issued a license authorizing the operation of a pinball game under the provisions of chapter 369, Oregon laws, 1925, in which an element of skill is involved, such an operation is not in any manner violative of any laws of the state of Oregon."

The letter in full is as follows: "Mr. Frank J. Newman, district attorney, Oregon.

"Mr. Syd I. Brown, sheriff, Medford, Oregon.

"Gentlemen: As attorneys for Murray Bell, we beg leave to advise you that under our interpretation of the law, when the city of Medford has issued a license authorizing the operation of a pinball game under the provisions of chapter 369, Oregon laws, 1925, in which an element of skill is involved, such an operation is not in any manner violative of any law of the state of Oregon, and while we realize that you have set August 25th as the last date when you, as the enforcing officers of this county, will permit such an operation by reason of your claim that it is unlawful, in order to get this matter definitely determined and settled for your benefit, as well as the benefit of our client and the public generally, we respectfully beg leave to advise that our client, whose place of business is located at 139 W. Sixth street, Medford, Oregon, will have a pinball game in his place of business for play, irrespective of the deadline set by you.

"This letter is not written to you in any spirit of defiance or disrespect of your respective authority, but merely for the purpose of obtaining an early determination as to whether or not this operation of this game which has been sanctioned by the legislature and licensed by the City of Medford is unlawful according to what is apparently your interpretation of the lottery provision of the constitution of the State of Oregon.

"We trust that you will cooperate with us in attempting to obtain a speedy determination of this matter. Very respectfully yours, ROBERTS & McALLISTER."

'RANCHERIA' NEAR BUTTE FALLS SOLD TO LOS ANGELESAN

The recent sale of "Rancheria," located about eight miles above Butte Falls, by Maud L. McDonald to Frederick M. Kincaid of Los Angeles, was announced today by the Charles A. Wing agency, which handled the transaction. Sale price was reported in excess of \$10,000.

Consisting of 300 acres, the property is considered one of the finest irrigated stock ranches in southern Oregon. Mr. Kincaid, who is a practicing attorney in Los Angeles, several years ago purchased the property adjoining "Rancheria" from the Charles A. Wing agency, and plans extensive improvements on both properties. He plans to make his future home there.

CRAWLS UNDER FLOOR TO LOCATE BLAZE AT WEST SIDE PHARMACY

An odd sort of fire threatened to do serious damage to the West Side Pharmacy at West Main and Grape streets for a time this morning, but after surmounting difficulties the fire department's chemical crew suppressed the blaze without damage to the drug store.

The blaze was probably caused by a cigarette dropped through a sidewalk grating on the Grape street side of the building, Fire Chief Roy Elliott said. Debris at the bottom of the opening under the grating was ignited.

A vent extended from the opening under the drug store floor and the fire extended into it, sending smoke up through the floor in the pharmacy. To find out precisely where the fire was, a fireman had to crawl for 30 feet under the floor and from there give directions for spraying chemical fluids over the blaze.

The grating is to be removed and the opening closed, Chief Elliott stated.
