2 CARS OF PEARS SENT TO LONDON BY ORCHARD HERE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Two cartons of Medford pears, consigned to London, went aboard the Furness motorship Pacific Grove today. The British Columbia Express and the Villager were expected to take on Oregon fruit next week.

The two cartons consigned to London were from the Bear Creek orchards owned by the Rosenbergs brothers. The pears were extra fancy Bartlett's intended for the select London trade, the orchard office said. The shipment was said to be one of the first consignments of Medford pears for the London market from here this season.

Bartlett shipments from the Rogue River valley total 96 cars to date, according to the freight department of the Southern Pacific railroad. Canary shipments total 71 cars. Twenty-five cars were shipped to eastern markets and for export shipment from Portland and other coast ports.

Picking and packing of Bartlett's will be completed by the end of next week. Many orchards are now in the second picking.

INSURGENTS SPEED TO ARAGON FRONT

(By The Associated Press) Generalissimo Francisco Franco, worried by the Spanish government's lusty drive near Zaragoza, was reported by insurgent sources today to be speeding a motorized column from conquered Santander to the Aragon front. These reports said the column hurriedly packed up and rolled out of the Biscayan seaport which it helped occupy yesterday, leaving strong northern army to prosecute cleanup operations east and west of Santander.

A Valencia communique said crack troops had swept to within four miles of the fortified Zaragoza, flanking it from the north and south to squeeze out the insurgents. Premier Benito Mussolini jubilantly acclaimed the Spanish insurgents' capture of Santander, a victory that cost Italy 341 soldiers killed and 1,676 wounded. He exchanged congratulatory messages with General Franco.

KLAMATH DRIVER FINED FOR SPEED ON STREET

Charles Schuse, 25, of Klamath Falls, was fined \$10 in city court this morning following his arrest by state police on North Riverside avenue for violation of the basic traffic rule. Schuse, according to the state police complaint, drove his machine at between 53 and 50 miles an hour past intersections.

OHIO MARKSMAN 'GOES STRAIGHT'

VANDALLIA, Ohio, Aug. 27.—(AP)—F. G. Carroll of Brecksville, O., broke 100 targets in a row today, from the 10-yard mark, to take the lead in the 38th annual Grand American handicap, feature event of trap-shooting sport. Carroll is the third man in history to go "straight" in the big target feature. Charley Young of Springfield, O., turning the trick from the 23-yard line in 1926, and R. Thompson of Calvanville, Mo., doing it in 1910.

Six men were tied at 99 out of 100 for second place, with 200 of the 1000 marksmen still to post their scores. They were Bruce Sloan of Albany, N. Y.; Ray C. Falcon of Evanston, Ill.; Forest McNeil of Houston, Tex.

TEACHERS FEDERATION AGREES TO VOTE UPON AFFILIATION WITH C.I.O.

MADISON, Wis., Aug. 27.—(AP)—A liberal faction, sustained by a triple victory, held administrative control of the American Federation of Teachers today.

Supporters of a movement for affiliation with the C.I.O. swept the convention's elections in their first triumph last night, re-electing Dr. Jerome Davis of New Haven, Conn., and seating 11 candidates in 15 vice-presidential posts.

The delegates, after a protracted three-hour session, then adopted, 283 to 227, a liberal majority report empowering the federation's executive council to conduct a national member referendum after Feb. 1, 1938 on the question of C.I.O. affiliation.

The third victory came when the convention voted down a proposal for a special "war chest" tax to fight the C.I.O. The teachers now are affiliated with the A.F.L. Winners in the vice-presidency elections included Hugh DeLoeay, Seattle, Wash.
