LEGAL NOTICES: CRATER LAKE - (Sp.) - Activities of civilian conservation corps camp are resulting in numerous park improvements, a current survey reveals. Jobs range from general maintenance to building construction.

LEGAL NOTICES: Providing enrollees with project training, the construction of three employe cottages in the Dark Hollow section near park headquarters is one of the more important CCC activities. A crew of 14 enrollees, under Foreman L. N. Foy of Camp Anas Spring is carrying on all construction, including even the more intricate carpentry problems. Three cottages, begun by enrollees last year, were completed this summer, making six buildings in this particular area.

LEGAL NOTICES: Of importance is the construction of a large comfort station in the main rim parking section. This building is now being faced with large lava rocks, in keeping with the general park architecture. With the exception of one or two skilled laborers, the entire job is being handled by enrollees.

BALLOONS TO GAIN WEATHER SECRETS OF STRATOSPHERE

Ingenious Device Will Be Carried Aloft By Small Gas Bags At Three Widely Separated Points.

MILTON, Mass., Aug. 27 - If anyone is interested in what the weather is like 50,000 feet above the earth, he can find out from the government next week.

The weather bureau is going to start exploring the stratosphere, by remote control. With a device so ingenious it practically talks, the bureau on September 1 will inaugurate a weather reporting service designed to find out days in advance whether the Kentucky derby will be run in mud or whether this season's first snowfall will occur on Sunday or Monday.

Influence Seen. The theory is that conditions prevailing in the upper air have more to do with heat waves, cold waves and mass attacks of bronchitis than anyone imagines.

The device is called a radio-meteorograph, and it is hooked to a small "sounding balloon." It supplies data on temperature, humidity and pressure at various altitudes by means of a wireless signal. Then it disappears somewhere.

"We seldom recover them," commented Dr. Karl O. Lange of Harvard university's Blue Hill observatory today. "We used to tuck one inside offering a reward for returning the thing, but few came back. They probably come down in some remote spot."

Plan Daily Flights. Dr. Lange is one of several scientists who have worked out specifications for the radio-meteorographs which, starting on Wednesday, will be sent aloft daily from Fairbanks, Alaska, Boston, Washington and Burbank, Cal.

At those four weather stations they will replace airplanes which have been carrying meteorographs aloft to 17,000 feet daily to check on the weather. More than a score of such airplane exploration flights will be continued at other weather stations pending a decision on the effectiveness of the balloon equipment.

The airplanes, each with the balloon complete with registering and wireless equipment can be bought for \$10 or so. Moreover, the airplanes have limited their explorations to a third or less of the height reached by the balloons.

CCC LABOR ADVANCES LAVA BEDS PLANS OF DEVELOPMENT DECADE

LAVA BEDS, Cal. - (Sp.) - Civilian conservation corps activities have placed the development of this national monument at least ten years ahead of what it would have been without CCC labor, a survey indicates.

Improvement of roads within the monument has been a major project in making different sections more accessible to the motoring public. Parking areas have been provided where necessary, and trails into lava caverns have been substantially improved by gravel and stone steps.

CCC enrollees have devoted many days to the development of camping facilities at the main camp ground near Indian Well. It is now equipped with tables, benches, stoves and fireplaces. These improvements have resulted in a more popular use of the camp ground. Table and bench combinations have been installed in a picnic ground near Flemer's Chimneys, interesting furnaces.
