

FOREST SERVICE BATTLES FLAMES ON HALIFAX CRK.

Rogue river national forest personnel last night were fighting a fire in timber land on Halifax creek about 20 miles east of Prospect. Twenty CCC men were rushed to the fire from Camp South Fork and 40 from Camp Applegate were sent to the Imnaha guard station for service this morning if needed. Simerl Jarvi, district ranger at Butte Falls, was in charge of the fire-fighting forces.

Portable field radio was sent to the scene and a crew was put to work stringing telephone lines to the fire zone from a point near the Imnaha guard station.

The fire was in a region inaccessible by motorized equipment and the fire-fighters took only hand tools. They had also to carry bedding. Food was sent in to them last night by a seven-mile pack trail. The area is accessible only by trails.

First men to the fire sent word back that it looked serious and might possibly spread over 250 acres. H. C. Obye, assistant supervisor in charge of fire control, made a flight over the area late yesterday afternoon and said the first report appeared to be somewhat exaggerated. From an altitude of 4,000 feet the fire appeared to cover about 20 acres. Mr. Obye said, adding, however, that he might not have been able to get a clear view of the blaze from such an altitude. Mr. Obye was flown by Thomas A. Gilbertson.

Taking no chances, Mr. Obye mobilized sufficient forces to combat a large, stubborn fire. He said the fire was caused by lightning several weeks ago or by a smoker. He said pre-emption pointed to a smoker because a lightning blaze would probably have shown up before now and because the fire started along a trail through the area which is used extensively by fishermen.

Smoke from the fire was spotted simultaneously at 7:15 yesterday morning by both the Bald Mountain and Buck Rock lookouts.

POSTPONE TRUCK LINE SUSPENSION

Postponement of the 30-day suspension of Consolidated Freight Lines Inc., recently ordered by the Oregon public utilities commissioner for alleged violation of the state motor transportation act, was announced yesterday by Phil McManamy, district manager of the trucking concern, after receiving official notice from the state commissioner.

The suspension, which would have been effective starting September 15, has been postponed for 60 days while the public utilities commissioner reviews the allegations. McManamy stated. Instead of being forced to suspend operations for 30 days throughout the entire state, Consolidated Freight Lines Inc. will probably be financially penalized, McManamy said. One of the largest trucking firms in the northwest, a suspension of operations would have thrown hundreds of employes out of work for a month, McManamy pointed out.

The original suspension was ordered August 16 by N. G. Wallace, state public utilities commissioner in Salem. It alleged that the trucking line operated its trucks over routes not included in its permit, of making payments to other trucking companies, of charging rates below those permitted in its permit, of granting rebates to shippers, of failing to issue bills of lading, of failing to file copies of its time schedule, and of making changes in its schedule without notifying the public utilities commissioner.

FINAL CALL FOR FREDERICK PUHL

Frederick A. Puhl died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Walter F. Love at Central Point, August 27, of heart trouble, aged 87 years, 27 months and 24 days, after an illness for the past 18 months. He was born in Germany Feb. 5, 1850. He came to the United States at the age of 22 years.

His father, August Puhl, had already come to Jackson county, residing on a farm east of Medford. Fred Puhl was a familiar citizen of Medford and was a friendly, congenial man, known to a host of friends. He has resided in Jackson county for the past 35 years.

He leaves four children, three sons and one daughter, Albert Puhl and Herbert of Medford, Fred Puhl of Portland, and a daughter, Mrs. Walter F. Love, Central Point, and three grandchildren: one brother, William Puhl, Gold Hill, Ore., and two sisters in Germany.

Funeral services will be held at the Perl funeral home Monday at 2:30 p. m., Rev. Werner Jensen of the Zion Lutheran church officiating. Interment will be in the Sitkoy Memorial park.

While awaiting transfer from the county jail to prison, Brown informed Williams, he escaped.

Williams said Gould also had served a seven-year term in San Quentin, Calif.

"This fellow," the police captain said, "has left a string of worthless checks clear across the country."
